PERSONAL TALK WITH COL. CODY

Speaks Well of Eugene and the Surrounding Country—Special Word for Eugene.

A GUARD reporter had the great pleasure of a personal talk with Col W F Cody this morning. He was very cordial in his expression of gratitude for the manner in which the press of the state has treated him and his huge aggregation of wonders. He is not arrogant with his prominence but an affable, frank-mannered man among men, ready to be courteous to everyone and ever on the alert to inspire confidence and place his visitors at ease.

"O by another newspaper man, Col Cody," said the reporter, timidly enough, as the famous man was striding about the arena before the parade. "Well, well, glad to meet you, sir. Your newspaper in this country are the best I ever saw to do justice to a meritable enterprise. I am just delighted with you—say, you have a pretty country surrounding Eugene. What's the population of the place?"

"Between four and five thousand," "Well, those hills over there," looking toward Spencer's Butte, "are just grand enough to have a million eyes look at them every day—and you'll have them here too some day. This kind of a country only needs knowing among people of the East to have them flock this way. Oh, the West is the only place for me."

The sturdy old scout threw back his shoulders and took a deep breath of the bracing morning air and continued: "Say, just tell your readers for me that you have one of the prettiest cities I have seen since coming to Washington or Oregon—and tell them I looked sidrers when I said it. Eugene looks all right."

The talk ran on with questions and answers both ways, and as we neared the Colneel's tent he said he would be glad to present the reporter to his daughter and sister who are accompanying him on this trip. The ladies also evinced delight with their Western experiences and said they were anxious to stay with the Colonel until the tour was completed, comprising a trip from Canada to the Gulf and from ocean to ocean, and thence to Europe next year.

A Road Accident.

While driving to town this morning in their buggy Mr and Mrs Aurelia Armitage, who reside above Springfield, were run into at a narrow place in the road this side of Springfield by a man and a boy on horseback. The buggy turned over, precipitating the occupants to the ground quite severely bruising and cutting Mrs Armitage. Mr Armitage held onto the reins and prevented a runaway. It is said this boy on the horse, whose name cannot be learned, also received injuries by the horse rearing and throwing him off.

A LONG JOURNEY COMPLETED

Fenton and Dolph Arrived Here This Morning After a Trip of 661 Miles Afoot.

Ralph Fenton and Ralph Dolph, the two University of Oregon students whom the GUARD mentioned the other day as being in Salem on their way to Eugene after a long trip on foot, arrived here at 7 o'clock this morning, having started out at 8 o'clock from point one mile this side of Junction City where they camped last night alongside a convenient patch of mast along the first train of Buffalo Bill's Wild West show and concluded to start on the last stretch of their long journey while it was cool.

The young men dropped into the GUARD office this morning to let us know of their arrival, and at first glance we took them to be two of Buffalo Bill's rough riders, but upon closer scrutiny we recognized their general physique. A luxuriant growth of beard adorned their faces, the boys not having even seen a razor since they left Eugene on June 6th.

Leaving Eugene they proceeded west to the Siuslaw Bay; thence north to Newport; from there along the coast to Astoria; from Astoria to Portland; from Portland to Mt Hood, and from Mt Hood on up the valley to Eugene, stopping at Salem and other points in the valley. Mr Fenton told us that the exact distance traveled was 661 miles. They carried their camping outfits on their backs and have many thrilling and interesting experiences to tell.

They will return to their homes in Portland tomorrow and be back here in time to resume their studies at the opening of the University. They expect to prepare an illustrated account of their trip for publication in the Oregonian soon.

A Financial Straw.
