PLAT OF THE CAR-NIVAL GROUNDS

Shows Location of Booths, Amusement Attractions, Etc.—In M. Svarverud's Hands.

S Klondahl, the surveyor and draughtsman, has drawn a plat of the Eugene Street Carnival grounds for Chairman Svarverud of the committee on concessions to better enable him to keep a record of booth spaces. Those who desire to secure locations for their booths are requested to call on Mr Svarverud and pick them out.

According to the plat the Carnival grounds include the two city parks and the streets surrounding them. The grounds will be enclosed and entrances will be located as follows: On Oak street between the rear of the opera house and Register office; on Oak between the jail and courthouse yards; on E at Eighth between the rear of the Eugene Loan & Savings bank and the new McClung block; and on East Eighth between the rear of Warnock's feed store and the Henderson residence. The booths will be located as follows: On the four sides of West park; the west side of East park; in front of the county jail, and along the west and south sides of Park street in the rear of the business houses on Willamette and East Ninth streets.

The tented shows and other attractions will occupy the streets that are not used by the booths. The interior of the two parks will be elaborately illuminated and a large number of seats will be placed therein for the convenience of the crowds who will listen to the music of the bands which will be located in the parks.

FUNDS COLLECTED. The committees out the other day to collect the pledges today made a report that \$1,135 had been collected and turned over. The fund will amount to about \$1,600 and is in sight. Finance for the proposition seem to be in satisfactory condition.

Mrs Trine Dead.

Word was received from Salem this morning that Mrs Hanna J Trine, the widow of the late John C T Trine, died in the Salem hospital at 7:30 o'clock last evening from paralysis. She deceased had been residing at Seattle but was taken to Salem recently for treatment in the hospital.

For a number of years Mrs Trine resided at Henderson station, and she leaves many friends who will be pained to hear of her death. She leaves three children, Ora Trine, at Salem, Emer at Pacific Grove, California, and a daughter, Ella, at Springfield.

Just a few days ago the government allowed her a pension and several hundred dollars back pay but she did not live to enjoy it.

The remains will arrive at Henderson Sunday afternoon and interment will take place immediately thereafter in Laurel Hill cemetery.

A Bad Bicycle Accident.

Floyd Kling, aged 18 years, a son of W S Kling, residing four miles below Eugene, met with a bad accident last night about 12:30 o'clock.

He had ridden to town on his bicycle to take in the Wild West show and when returning home the forks of the wheel broke square in two, pitching young Kling with great force to the ground, striking on his face. The portion of the road where he hit was gravelled and the sharp edges of the gravel cut a big gash through his tongue and lacerated his lip and other portions of his face in a terrible manner. He managed to reach home and Dr L W Brown was sent for to attend the lad's injuries. The doctor sewed up the cuts and this morning the boy was brought to the Eugene hospital where Dr D A Paine further administered to him.

Refused Assistance.

An unknown man, apparently a Swede, was discovered beneath the elevated sidewalk on South Willamette street last night after the show. He had quite a gash in his scalp and utterly refused to be helped out of his predicament. Several young men offered to help him, but he was a powerful fellow and did not seem to appreciate the intended kindness. He finally crawled out and walked down the road, lost in the crowd. He probably fell from the sidewalk and was temporarily dazed by the shock.

TWO MORE DIVORCE CASES

Emma Corbus Sues F. E. Corbus, and Maud Healey Close Sues Fred Close.

Through her attorney, G F Skippworth, Mrs Emma Corbus today filed a suit in the Lane county circuit court against her husband, F E Corbus, for divorce. The complaint alleges as follows:

That plaintiff and defendant were married in Eugene on or about September 22, 1894; that there is no issue of said marriage; that during all the time plaintiff and defendant have been husband and wife said plaintiff has observed her marriage vows and treated defendant with affection and forbearance, but that on or about May 2, 1898, defendant without cause or provocation, deserted plaintiff and never since lived separate and apart from her; that defendant has refused and neglected to support plaintiff; that plaintiff's maiden name was Emma Dougherty and she desires that her name be changed from Emma Corbus back to her maiden name.

CLOSE VS CLOSE.

Maud Healey Close has instituted suit against Fred Close for divorce. The complaint sets forth as follows:

That the couple were married at Harrisburg, Or, June 10, 1893; that the plaintiff always and at all times treated defendant with kindness and affection and performed her marriage vows well and faithfully; that defendant disregarding his marriage vows, wrongfully, wilfully and without provocation on or about September 22, 1894, deserted and abandoned plaintiff and has continued to live apart from plaintiff; that defendant has failed, neglected and refused to contribute anything toward plaintiff's support and that she has had to earn her own living by her own personal labor; that one girl, Mabel Close, aged 8 years, is the only issue of said marriage and plaintiff asks for custody of said child.
