One started at Chazy Brown's cabin, (45 miles east of Eugene on the south side of the river), ran east to the top of the mountain, then the wind changed and drove it quartering back towards the river. It is in the tree tops and takes everything in front of it. The country about is covered with burned leaves. Charley Brown came out of the woods Thursday night, and he was scared. He said the fire was close to Andy Taylor's cabin and it would surely go as the fire was in the tree tops. Another timber fire is burning a little lower down in the vicinity where James Wycoff is building a number of cabins for homesteaders.
