It seems that the young man was rowing in a small boat with his two brothers out to the steamer Mink with a load of fish, when he was thrown out of the boat in some manner and sank to the bottom before he could receive assistance. All efforts were made to save him but to no avail.

The drowned man is single and has numerous relatives on the lower Siuslaw.

THE SOCIAL REALM

IN HONOR OF THE PRESIDENT.

At the home of Mr and Mrs S H Friendly next Friday evening a reception to students, new and old, and the faculty of the University will be given in honor of President Prince L Campbell. The event promises to be one of the leading social events of the season.

Died.

T G Gillilan died at Union, Union county, this morning, so a dispatch to J F Robinson, secretary of the Eugene Masonic lodge, states.

Mr Gillilan was a pioneer resident of Lane county, having located at Pleasant Hill when about thirty-two years of age in the early fifties. He had served an apprenticeship to a chair and furniture maker before that time so he was able to supply the pioneer settlement with needed furniture. It was a common saying that his chairs never broke down or wore out. He married a Miss Cromwell of Coast Fork and they located on a farm in the Pleasant Hill country, moving to Union county about fifteen years ago.

An aged wife, one son and four daughters survive him, the son having married the young daughter of George Stowell, formerly of Eugene. He was about seventy years of age.

He became a member of the Eugene Masonic lodge in its early days and retained membership till death. Those who knew him best give him the name of being an honest, upright man.

"Old Horse" Sale.
