THE TIMBER MARKET.

Loggers will advance the price of logs over on Gray's Harbor to \$6 a thousand. The people who are selling Lane county timber claims that go from five to fifteen million feet all the way from \$800 to \$1500 should take warning and hold their timber for an adequate price, if possible. This advance is the second one recently, both amounting to one dollar per thousand.

At six dollars a thousand a very ordinary timber claim for Lane county—five million feet—would realize \$3000, less logging expenses, while a one dollar a thousand advance would add five hundred dollars to the value of the quarter-section. People who sell their timber at present prices will regret it before many years.

Talk about the irony of fate! It is not half expressive enough in the case of the captain of the British ship, who was going down the Columbia on a river steamer to join his ship when the latter all but stripped the upper works off the river boat, and though there were several narrow escapes of the sleeping passengers hurt no one but the British captain.
