RULES GOVERNING ATHLETICS

Board of Directors of Public Schools Adopt a Set of Regulations.

At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the Eugene public schools, the following rules and regulations governing student associations at this High School were adopted:

1.—No person may be a member of any student organization of the Eugene High School who is not a member in good standing in this school and carrying at least three studies therein.

2.—All meetings of the student body or any part thereof in the school house at night must secure the permission of the superintendent and arrangements must be made for the presence of the janitor to attend to unlocking and closing of building, fire and lights.

3.—No student may be a member of the football team or of any athletic association whose standing from day to day as shown by teachers' records is unsatisfactory in any subject and whenever notice of unsatisfactory standing is given to any student such notice shall end and determine his connection with the team or association on pain of expulsion from school for disobedience.

4.—Regulation 8 holds for all pupils. All pupils who have been in attendance in a previous year only such will be allowed to participate in any game who in their previous attendance have been in school continuously at least seven of the nine months.

5.—All coaches, instructors or helpers in any organization can be engaged only on permission of the board of directors.

6.—All games must be submitted to the superintendent for his approval before final arrangements are made, and no game shall be permitted which will incur an indebtedness for which the money is not previously provided.

7.—It is hereby made unlawful to levy any tax or burden on the whole body of students and all funds for the support of athletics or other enterprises must be secured by voluntary subscription.

8.—No student will be permitted to take part in any athletic exercise or game unless he have the written consent of his parents and filed such consent with the superintendent.

9.—The financial affairs of the football team and of the athletic association are under the control of the board of directors and any disobedience to their instructions subjects the guilty person to expulsion from school.

10.—Any ungentlemanly behavior at football or while in attendance at any game is strictly forbidden and disregard for this regulation will be severely dealt with.

It is probable that the star halfback will not appear in football uniform again this year on account of his bereavement.

Smith's sudden retirement from the University of California will be a severe blow to the California team. For the last four years he has held his place behind the line in the intercollegiate contests. In line bucking Smith has no equal on the Pacific coast. Because of his fierce playing he was styled "Locomotive" by the football enthusiasts.
