Spiders.

Mushrooms Easily Grown.

Any one may raise mushrooms in his cellar or even in his attic with very satisfactory results.

He should have a bed which may consist of a shallow box, and this should be filled with a dark, rich loam to the depth of, say, eight inches. It should be in a dark place, and a damp place also is beneficial, but if he uses an attic the room may be kept dark by frequent watering. An average temperature of from 60 to 70 degrees should be maintained. Almost all seedmen sell the spawn bricks, and when the bed is prepared the spawn should be broken into fine surface particles and just covered with the earth.

The Gervais Fire.

A yesterday dispatch has full particulars about the Gervais fire. It says:

Fire last night wiped out the business portion of Gervais, two blocks of business houses being swept by the flames. The fire started shortly after 10 o'clock and originated either in a confectionery store in the middle of the block or in the alley back of Weiss' furniture store. All buildings destroyed were frame with the exception of the old brick bank building. The only business houses left standing were M. S. Peckner's general merchandise store and Scott Taylor's harness shop. The water tank also burned and no water could be obtained with which to fight the fire.

The city had no fire apparatus, and the citizens, wildly excited, could do little but save some of the personal property women and children materially assisting in the effort. The depot and hotel narrowly escaped the flames.
