To Patrons of the City Schools.

The number of pupils in actual attendance on Monday last was 969. The number in average attendance for the first school month of last year was 831. Certain grades of the schools are at present so crowded that applicants for admission have been refused admission at this time for lack of room. The board of directors anticipate that this condition may become general. In order that the board may have all the facts before them, so that they may make some provision in so far as our congested condition make it necessary, the undersigned has been instructed to urge all parents whose children are not yet in school to have them report at their respective schools on Monday the 13th inst, for enrollment. Where this for any reason is not possible they are urged to notify me by letter or in person, naming the children, the grade affected, and when they propose to enter. This will materially help the board to information necessary for proper action.

LARGE AMOUNT OF DELINQUENT TAXES

\$7,484.42 Remained Unpaid When the Rolls Closed Monday, Oct. 6.

Taxes became delinquent on Monday, October 6th, and hereafter those who did not pay before that date will be levied upon and the costs of the levy will be added to the penalty already attached under the new law.

The amount of Lane county taxes which became delinquent on Monday, according to the figures in the sheriff's office, is \$7,484.42, which is a very large delinquency, more than for any year in several years past.

The only way of accounting for this large delinquency is that the new law is unsatisfactory or is misunderstood.

TO BEAUTIFY SCHOOL GROUNDS

Petition Circulated for Having Grounds Smoothed and Converted Into Lawns.

The following petition is being circulated about the city and is being quite liberally signed:

EUGENE, Or, October 6, 1902.
 TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT No 4:

GENTLEMEN: We, the undersigned, citizens and patrons of the schools, most respectfully petition your honorable body that you cause steps to be taken during the present school year to have the grounds about the Geary, Patterson and Central buildings filled, smoothed and converted into lawns and otherwise improved by the planting of shrubs, etc, and to cause these grounds to be kept in a neat and green condition by having them sprinkled, the grass cut from time to time and cared for, in order that these places may be what they were meant to be, centers of good influence.

The members of the board express themselves as being in favor of beautifying the school grounds, but the matter which requires their first consideration is that of providing more school room. At present the schools are very badly crowded, and a provision must be made at once to accommodate the children or people will begin to leave the city on account of lack of school facilities.

It is going to take money to furnish additional room, also to improve the school grounds. The former matter is the more important of the two, hence will receive the first consideration. Afterward the grounds will no doubt be looked after.
