WHO IS ALLOWED TO PLAY

College Association Has Adopted Rules Governing Athletics.

Meeting of Presidents, Deans and Professors in Portland Saturday Afternoon—U. O. Not Affected.

As announced in Friday's GUARD, the College Association of Western Oregon met in Portland Saturday afternoon to hear the report of the committee appointed in Eugene last June to draw up a set of resolutions to govern athletics in the colleges and schools of Western Oregon. The meeting was attended by fifteen presidents, deans and professors of a dozen Western Oregon educational institutions, among whom were President P. L. Campbell of the U. O. The committee was composed of Prof. J. B. Horner, of O. A. C.; Principal S. R. Johnston, of Portland; Prof. W. H. McCall, of Willamette University; President P. L. Campbell, of University of Oregon; Prof. H. L. Bates, of Forest Grove.

The sense of the resolutions adopted is as follows:

First—That it is not advisable at present to enter upon any formal organization.

Second—The president or principal shall certify to the bona fide student standing of all members of teams at least five days before playing of any game. A bona fide student shall be a student taking not less than 12 periods of recitations per week.

Third—No new student shall be allowed to participate in any intercollegiate or interscholastic game who has not been entered as a student at least two weeks prior to the game.

Fourth—No person having been a member of a school or college athletic team during any year and having been in attendance less than one college half year shall be permitted to play in any intercollegiate or interscholastic contest thereafter until he shall have been in attendance six consecutive calendar months.

Fifth—No student must be influenced to leave one school for another.

Sixth—All game schedules must be submitted to college authorities for suggestions.

Seventh—Names of officials must be submitted to authorities five days before game.

Eighth—In case of protest of any nature the protesting school shall name an arbitrator, the school protested shall name the second and the two shall name the third. The decision of this committee shall be final.

Ninth—Coaches and professionals prohibited from intercollegiate or interscholastic games.

Tenth—These resolutions be adopted by all educational institutions of Western Oregon.

The U. O. team is not affected by these new rules as similar rules have been in force here for some time.

SOLD THEIR GROCERY BUSINESS

Mr. and Mrs. L. O. Beckwith Will Retire From Active Business Life.

Mr. and Mrs. L. O. They started in business here with nothing, and in these 13 years, by their careful and straightforward business methods, they have had a splendid trade and now own the property in which the store is located, besides other valuable business property and a number of residence lots. They intend to erect a brick building on their grocery store corner in the not far future.

Fell to Their Death.

PARIS, Oct. 13.—M. D. Bradsky, a French aeronaut, and his companion, M. Morin, fell to their death from an airship this morning.

The start from the ground was made successfully, the aeronaut apparently having complete control of the machine. They arose some distance and sailed about, forward and backward, up and down, for an hour, a large throng of spectators watching the evolutions.

Suddenly when at a height of several hundred feet the car in which the aeronauts rode was seen to part from the airship.

It fell to the ground with frightful rapidity. Bradsky and Morin were instantly killed, their bodies being crushed almost beyond recognition.
