TO RE-OPEN ATHLETIC RELATIONS

Steps to Bring About Peace Between Oregon and Washington Universities.

The Seattle correspondent of the Portland Telegram says:
 "The University of Oregon has taken the initiative toward the reopening of collegiate relations with the University of Washington. Letters have been received from the faculty and students of the U O, stating that those responsible for the breach last year have left school, and that the new men who are in charge of athletic affairs this year are anxious to reopen athletic relations.
 "The Pearson brothers, the star athletes on the Washington team, were the cause of trouble last year. After their arrival, the Oregon boys charged that the Pearsons were professionals, and demanded that they be excluded from the list of contestants on the Washington team. As there was no time before the meet to investigate the charges Washington refused to exclude the Pearsons. Then Oregon made no effort to win, and was defeated to the tune of 113 to 19, scoring just enough to entitle them to their portion of the gate receipts."
