SMALLPOX CARELESSNESS.

These people who have handled smallpox patients or their belongings without warrant should be quarantined. It is not only a matter of protection to innocent people from the loathsome disease but a matter of business to the town.

A smallpox epidemic would mean a loss of many thousands of dollars to our business people. It is the duty of our city officials to put every man, woman or child who has been exposed to infection into strict quarantine.

Norway people will go hungry—at least they will if dependent on pickled cayuse meat. The horse-pickling factory down the river from Portland burnt down Saturday night. Nearly all the product went to Norway.

The interest in timber lands in The Dalles district is indicated by the number of filings received in a period covering a little over a year, which amounted to over 700, as compared with about 100 timber filings made in the previous twenty years.

Very properly the sheriff at Portland announces that he will not make the hanging soon to take place in that city a pay spectacle—a kind of a benefit for the orphaned son of the unfortunate man. It was a preposterous idea to support the son off money bought with the blood of the father.

Portland police officers got very close to Chinese gamblers the other night. They got \$100.75 which the Chinamen could not care for in their haste to escape. This was not the first hundred dollars the police got from the Chinamen. No one, not even the police, know how many hundreds and thousands of dollars have been slipped into officials hands that nothing might be seen.

The Law Enforcement League of Portland has bumped up against the several city and state peace officials in the effort to compel Sunday closing of Portland saloons, with little satisfaction. The chief of police says it is the duty of the sheriff to arrest the saloonkeepers while the county official blandly passes it on to the grand jury. The saloonkeepers have several votes in Portland and the officials are wary.

San Francisco is experiencing a singular epidemic—that of suicide. There have been forty suicides during the present month in that city, which would mean a death rate, from suicide alone, of one person in every 800 in San Francisco for the year. Most of these have thus far proven victims of misplaced affection. The death rate from love disappointments alone is steadily increasing. Every conceivable pathway toward the beyond is chosen by the victims; who are for the most part women.

The Vatican should get a schoolmaster for one of its subordinates, Archbishop Chapelle just returned to Rome from the Philippines. He complains that the Americans set their interests in politics and personal aims above the advancement of church and religion. It looks as if that ecclesiastic is ignorant of the fact that the people of this country went out of the church and state partnership business July 4th, 1776. In this country the church is no exception to the rule that it is a free field for honest endeavor.

State Labor Commissioner William Blackman of Washington has given notice that stores and factories employing female help must observe the 10-hour a day law. Complaints have been made that there are violations in several sections of the state, and he intends taking cognizance thereof and enforcing prosecutions. The law has recently been declared constitutional, and he proposes that it shall be strictly enforced.

New Woman Happenings

THE strangest episode in the United States in years, perhaps ever, is that which began the meat boycott in New York. In this free country, the land of plenty, in a year of almost unparalleled prosperity, that there should be meat riots at all is scarcely believable; that they should be started by women, and by Jewish women, the most conservative of their sex, looks on the face of it impossible; yet it is a fact. What the future Herbert Spencers will deduce from it concerning a republic where meat food is more abundant than in any other country of civilization it would be interesting to know. Jewish mothers, Russians and Poles mostly, on the famous east side of New York city, saw the price of meat go beyond where they could buy it for their children. Enraged, a number of them, perhaps a hundred in all, determined that no butcher in their neighborhood should sell meat to anybody, and they executed their resolve. The rage increased, and they rioted. The police of New York city were unable to stop the movement, which carried all before it. A woman's anti-beef association was formed to boycott the dealers. The women's husbands grumbled at first, but yielded and at length were drawn into the current too. The women called great mass meetings, but as they were unaccustomed to public speaking they were shrewd enough to get eloquent labor orators to do the talking for them. Higher and higher the anti-beef current rose. It is a most curious feature of the affair that the rioting women were all orthodox Jews, and when Saturday came, their Sabbath, all was quiet, but at the going down of the sun that day the fight was on again. It was continued until the women had closed every beef shop in their part of New York. Sometimes they poured kerosene over the stock of a dealer who tried to oppose them. If this is not like the French revolution, what is?

You cannot pick up a newspaper that has not a scene—no matter what, if there is a woman in it—in which the gifted reporter does not ascribe "hysteria" or the "verge of hysteria" to the woman. Man has reached that point apparently where he can't tell hysteria from just a plain cry.

It has been frequently decided that a drunken man is not responsible for his actions, and therefore he is sometimes let off where a woman under the like circumstances would surely be put in to a police cell. Perhaps a man may not be responsible for his actions after he is drunk, but he is certainly responsible for getting drunk.

None of the fashionable women's clubs seem to have yet discovered that working and striving and speaking up for universal peace among the nations is a task peculiarly feminine and fitted to the most conservative of the sex. It has been left for the strongminded woman suffrage societies to take the initiative in this glorious work and aspiration.

What are we coming to? After appropriating our time honored long skirts to themselves are men, clerical or otherwise, how to set up and tell women they shall wear their own clothes in a church choir? The most impressive choir I ever beheld was that of St. James, the church of the gifted, eloquent and world famous Rev. H. H. Havels, in London, and it consisted of surprised and casked women, whose sweet and thrilling voices sounded like the music of angels. Rev. Mr. Havels himself established this surprised choir of women, and it was the pride and joy of his life. And now comes an American bishop, unknown to fame except as he will get it in a manner not enviable through this medieval ruling, and says women shall wear the regulation choir garments in his part of the world, just because they are women. Dear, dear! I am interested now to know how many women will have sufficient spirit and respect for the dignity of their womanhood to leave his church altogether.
