A FORMER LEADER OF WOMEN DEAD.

Probably no woman in American history has filled the public eye and mind to the extent of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, who died at her home in New York, Sunday, of old age. She was nearly 87.

Mrs. Stanton was born at Johnstown, New York, November 12, 1815. She first came into prominence as one of the leaders in the anti-slavery movement, and was one of the first to take up the question of woman's rights. She was educated at Troy, New York, and married H. Brewster Stanton, an anti-slavery newspaper man, in 1840. Mrs. Stanton was one of the women who signed the call for the first woman's rights convention, held at Seneca Falls, New York, in July, 1849.
