At the last moment Wade Rhine and Mrs Rhine, whose stage name is Leona Leigh, refused to take their lines and the production was called off, to the disappointment of a good crowd.

The offending couple had been given notice that the show would disband for reorganization in two weeks and they understood the hint and threw the company down hard.

BIG TIMBER DEAL IN LINN COUNTY

Portland Telegram: Waldo A Avery, of Detroit, and C H Green, of Eagle, Mich, two prominent lumbermen, have just completed the purchase of 22,000 acres of timber land in Linn county, the sum involved being about \$800,000. In company with the Moylean brothers of this city, Messrs Green and Avery spent the past two weeks traveling over the land and camping out at night along the crystal streams which empty into the Thomas fork of the Santiam. They were delighted with their outing and consider the fall climate just perfection.

The purchased land lies on an elevated bunch of the Cascade foothills and is well covered with a splendid growth of yellow pine and hemlock, the average amount being conservatively estimated at 75,000 feet to the acre. The tract lies contiguous to the Southern Pacific and the Corvallis & Eastern railroads and is just north of the large possessions of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co.
