## SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT MABEL

A Log Rolled Over Samuel M. Stiers—Two Horses Killed.

Samuel M. Stiers, residing in the Fall Creek country in the vicinity of Lowell, was the victim of a serious accident Wednesday.

Word has been received here that while at work in the Trent Lumber Co's logging camp at Mabel his life was nearly crushed out by a huge log rolling over him. It seems that he was driving a four-horse team when a log in some manner became loose and rolled down the hill, striking the team and driver, killing two of the horses out right and would have killed Mr. Stiers had he not been between the horses some way. As it was his life was despaired of for awhile. His injuries were very bad. He was hurt internally and several bones were broken. Dr. H. F. Ogil, of Wendling, attended him. The injured man belongs to Eugene Tent, Knights of the Macabees.
