TWO YOUTHFUL BURGLARS CAUGHT

Robbed the Imperial Hotel at Cottage Grove--Brought to Eugene.

Last evening's late train from Cottage Grove brought Constable B K Lawson in charge of the two youthful prisoners, charged with stealing \$7.50 and a rifle from the Imperial Hotel in Cottage Grove a few days ago. They were caught in Ashland and brought back.

Their names are Byron Daniels, aged 17 years, and Norman Daniels, aged 15 years. After their arrest they admitted their guilt. The boys arrived at Ashland Sunday and the younger of the two worked a day or two at the Ashland House washing dishes.

The goods were stolen on the 10th, one of the boys having before worked in the burglarized hotel. When captured they had but 25 cents and stated they had left the gun on the railroad track near Grants Pass, being unable to sell it.

The boys say they are from Washington, that their mother is dead and their father is a drunkard and his whereabouts are unknown by them. The younger claims that he stole the goods and completely exonerated his brother.

The younger boy, Norman Daniels, was today sentenced to the reform school by Judge H R Kincaid. The older boy will be held to appear before the circuit court.

Quartz Creek Timber Land Sales.

A short time since we noted the forming of a pool of about six thousand acres of timber land on Quartz Creek, a small tributary of the McKenzie river, emptying into that stream from the south forty-two miles east of Eugene.

Dr T W Harris, who held the largest single interest at the time of the formation of the pool, has increased his holdings to two thousand acres through the purchase of the John Kelly, Misses Kate and Bessie Kelly, J H Booth and W T Campbell interests, comprising 1200 acres.

This is probably the finest body of timber in Lane county, or the state for that matter.

Altogether there are about twelve thousand acres of deeded land in the Quartz Creek district, all available timber.

Mrs Rebecca Currie died at her home on South Olive street, Eugene, this morning after an illness of nearly six weeks, aged 75 years, 11 months and 18 days.
