SOME UNIVERSITY SPIRIT.

The students of Glasgow university, Scotland, are a strenuous lot of youth. They are now engaged in a campaign for the election of a rector, and the university is split into two camps, unionists and liberals.

The other day the liberals attempted to hold a meeting. The unionists attempted to wreck the hall to prevent the meeting. Both sides were armed with clubs and flour, and fought fiercely for an hour.

Finally it was necessary to call in the police. When the hated "bobbies" appeared, both fighting bodies of students joined forces and attacked the police. Reinforcements were summoned from headquarters, and after an hour's fighting the students were subdued.

But the police had to turn the hose on the youths before they succumbed. Many were injured, both police and students. At one time 1,500 were fighting strenuously.

None of the rioters were prosecuted. "Hazing" is unknown in British universities. One fears to consider the consequences if such strenuous students as these Glasgow men indulged in the game.

TOO MUCH SENSATION.

A too vivid imagination has got William R. Draper, a St. Louis newspaper correspondent, into serious trouble. Last July he wrote an article for the Philadelphia North American stating that White Buffalo, an Oklahoma Indian, had been sent to the government school for Indians at Carlisle, where he was educated; that he had returned to his tribe imbued with a deep hatred for the white race; that he first met Mary Andrews, and after courting her for a while, bound her to a pony and when found she was dead; that he then met Annie Dennis and after a short courtship her throat was cut; that White Buffalo then met Maude Ellis and in a short time she was found with a knife in her heart.

The article then went on to state that White Buffalo was in jail charged with the murders. All this was false. The Philadelphia paper will prosecute the faking correspondent to the last extremity for his untrue and libelous statements.

"HUCKLEBERRY FINN" DRAMATIZED
Mark Twain's play, "Huckleberry Finn," was given its first presentation on any stage at Hartford, Conn. recently, and scored a sensational success, says a newspaper account:

One scene is really the most remarkable ever achieved on the stage. It is the Missouri river, reflecting the warm sunshine of a summer's day. In the foreground is the favorite "swimming hole" of the village boys. Stretching far away in the distance are the reaches of the river.

A picnic and temperance revival crowd the stage with quaintly dressed figures, with Band of Hope sashes and white, gold lettered banners. The crowd disperses in the afternoon, and the river ripples in peace until a crowd of boys dash on for a dip. They dive in, splash around and have no end of fun. It is all very natural and a wonderful illustration of the evolution of theatrical mechanics.

POPE LEO REACHING FOR A CENTURY.
It is reported from Rome that the Pope is in excellent health, despite his great age—ninety-two years. Leo XIII has now occupied the papal throne longer than any other

pope since Pius IX. Of the 262 popes, Leo has reigned longer than any except his predecessor, Pius IX.

The latter was pope thirty-one years, while Leo this week has been in the papal chair nearly twenty-five years.

In age Leo XIII is third among popes, for Saint Agathus lived to be 107 and Gregory IX lived to be ninety-nine. Leo XIII looks exceedingly frail, but mentally he is as young as a man of fifty.

He takes the greatest care of his health, and it is not at all improbable that he may live to become a centenarian, despite the vast amount of work and worry of the papal office.
