Evidence before the coal strike commission yesterday showed that at two collieries one hundred and sixteen thousand tons of coal more than the miners had been paid for had been sold. Simply through the collieries requiring the men to dig 3138 pounds for a ton of 2240 pounds, the excess of almost nine hundred pounds being required of the miners to make good the dirt and waste. The miners assert that five hundred to six hundred pounds of that excess was merchantable coal.
