ORDERED AN INVESTIGATION

The result of the meeting called by the mayor last evening at the town hall for the purpose of getting an expression of the citizens on the question of extending the city limits so as to include the burg of Fairmount may be summarized in a few words.

After discussing the various phases of the question the mayor appointed a committee to look up the probable valuation of Fairmount taxable property and other phases of the question, and report the same to another public meeting to be called by the mayor. The committee consisted of C S Williams, J M Williams and M Svarveruo.

The meeting organized with Mayor Christmas as chairman and J M Williams, secretary. The attendance was quite good. There is certainly a desire on the part of the Fairmount people to come to the limits of the thriving city of Eugene. This is only a question of time. It is said that even if present indications should be against the extension, Eugene should look ahead to the future. A discouragement at the present time would be a set-back to the growth of both places.

There is little doubt but that action will be taken to instruct our representatives in the legislature to procure an extension to the city limits.
