A Hundred Thousand

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan 13.—Winnie B Marcer, the pitcher of the all American baseball team, now playing in this city, suicided at the Occidental Hotel last night. Marcer fastened a rubber tube to the gas jet in his room, placed the loose end of the tube in his mouth then turned on the gas, inhaling it till he became unconscious. When found he was alive but died without regaining consciousness.

Free Coal for Coal Trust.

WASHINGTON, Jan 13.—The House ways and means committee in session this morning decided to report a substitute to the Hill bill.

A rebate equal to the tariff imposed will be allowed on all kinds of coal imported from all sources for one year from the date of adoption.

This virtually places coal on the free list, as it is not probable that with free coal once the country would submit to any tax being imposed on it at any time thereafter.

Terrible Cattle Loss.

CHAMBERLAIN, South Dakota, Jan 13.—Stockmen all over the Dakotas, Wyoming and Eastern Montana are despondent on account of large losses of cattle, with more in prospect.

Prominent stockmen estimate the loss of cattle from blizzards since January 1st will reach fully one hundred thousand head. And, they assert, the worst is yet to come as fully a million head are starving now.

TO TRANSFER THE CONTRACT

City Lights will be Furnished by
a New Corporation.—
Council Notes.

The City Council met last evening with all the members present. The usual routine of business was transacted. The street committee reported 10,762 feet of lumber used last month in the construction of cross walks. The health committee reported 30 families quarantined for contagion.

The bill prepared by the city attorney for presentation to the legislature asking a change in the boundary line of the city to include Fairmount and College Hill was read and ordered forwarded to the legislature.

PIRE CHIEF'S REPORT.

W C Yoran, as fire chief, submitted his annual report to the council. The department now has a membership of 173 divided among five companies. The expense for 1902 was reported as being \$280. There have been 3 serious or destructive fires and seven alarms of no consequence. The report was referred to the fire and water committee.

LIGHT CONTRACT TRANSFERRED.

The important part of the session was the granting of the right of transferring the contract to light the city to a new corporation which proposes to operate from Springfield. The petition was from the present company, the Eugene Electric Light Company. This means that this company will enlarge its power and station, move its base to Springfield and operate on a much larger scale than heretofore. New capital will be introduced.

The power will be furnished by the Booth-Kelly Company at Springfield, as they control the power there. The petition was presented by A C Woodcock, attorney for the company, and an ordinance was immediately introduced granting the prayer and the contract will be immediately transferred to the new company, which will be known as the Eugene & Springfield Electric Light and Power Company.

TAX LEVY FIXED.

An ordinance was presented fixing the tax levy for the year at 8 mill, divided as follows: General purposes, 5 mill; street, 1.45 mill; sewer, 1 mill; library, 1.5 mill. The total city tax for this year will be 8 1/2 mills as compared with 3 1/2 mills last year.

SEWERS.

The Recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for constructing sewers as to specifications on Pearl and Eleventh streets.

THE WHITE DOVE IS ON HAND

Oregon and Washington End the
Three Year's Quarrel Over
Athletics.

The white-winged dove of peace has visited the State Universities of Oregon and Washington, and the fierce athletic war recently waged between these institutions has come to an end. Already arrangements are being made for a football game for next season to be played in Seattle during the month of November.

The bone of contention between these schools has been track athletics, the three annual meets being productive of much harshness.

Oregon and Washington are the leading institutions of their kind in the Pacific Northwest and are natural rivals in all departments of student enterprise. Contests between these institutions should be made the most important athletic events of the year in this region, and it is hoped that differences may be settled on the field of sport in a clean and friendly manner.

The pipe of peace ought to be passed around and everybody given a good and lasting smoke, as such squabbles as have hitherto existed should have no place in college sport. Yesterday's Oregonian prints this and adds, "No Flowers."

OREGON LEGISLATURE

Senate Does a Rushing
Business Introducing
Bills.

Milt Miller Introduces Flat Salary
State Officers' Bill—Mum-
mey Gets Clerk-
ship.

SALEM, Jan 13.—A Lane county man, E R Mumme, was remembered in the distribution of clerkships today.

According to the House apportionment Lane county was allowed one appointment. This the Lane delegation bestowed on Mr Mumme. He held the clerkship on the same mode of appointment at the session of 1901.

The Senate rushed business today, twenty-four bills being introduced. Several resolutions were introduced and referred. An appropriate committee calling for the appointment of special committees to investigate state offices and the affairs of state institutions.

Senator Milt Miller of Linn county introduced a flat salary bill for state officers.

ELECTRIC LIGHT ENTERPRISE

A Reorganization of the Old
Company—Booth-Kelly Peo-
ple Take an Interest.

Nothing in the city council proceedings last night that the Electric Light Company had procured the consent of the city to transfer their city contract to a new company the GUARD learns the following facts:

Owing to the rapid growth of Eugene and the increased demand for service the company finds it necessary to make large additions to the plant. While all details are not yet worked out sufficient headway has been made to warrant the statement that the company has been organized with sufficient capital to absorb the present plant and put in a large transmission power plant at Springfield capable of furnishing light and power for the needs of Eugene, Fairmount and Springfield for several years to come.

A large amount of fuel will be necessary to furnish power for the contemplated twenty-four hour service. The electric light people have associated themselves with the Booth-Kelly Company, and contracted for the sawdust and slabwood necessary for fuel. The current will be generated at the Springfield station, while the present station in Eugene will probably be maintained as a distributing point for this city. The present stockholders retain their interest in the new company, and with the new stockholders will continue the business.

While the Electric Light people are giving splendid service, this new alignment will add greatly to the interests of Eugene and our adjacent communities.

REMAINS OF THE OREGON STATESMAN

The body of Representative Thomas H Tongue left Washington last night on a special car, and will arrive in Portland Saturday morning or afternoon.

It is accompanied by Mr Tongue's family and by a committee from each house of Congress, including Representative Moody, of Oregon.

The funeral will be held on Sunday at Hillsboro, and will be arranged by Mrs Tongue. Resolutions of regret at Mr Tongue's death were passed by each house of Congress yesterday, and both adjourned in respect to his memory.

Trip of Inspection.

A party of railroad officials passed through Eugene this morning on an inspecting trip. The party contained Manager Kohler, Superintendent Fields, Roadmaster Johnson and others.
