ATLANTIC HURRICANE

Big Sailing Ship on Reef off New Jersey Coast.

Senator Platt of New York Re-elected—Colonel Lynch on Trial for Treason to British Government.

LONDON, Jan 21.—Colonel Lynch, the Irish member of parliament for Galway, who resigned his seat in that body and accepted a commission in the Boer army to fight against the British, then returned to Great Britain, when he was arrested, was placed on trial this morning for treason.

The proceedings are being held in the Royal Law Courts of this city.

A Chicago Fire.

CHICAGO, Jan 21.—A fire in a fashionable apartment house early this morning imperilled the lives of sixty persons.

A woman who jumped from the third story was fatally injured. The loss will reach sixty thousand dollars.

New York's Boss.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan 21.—Thomas C Platt was reelected to succeed himself as United States senator at the joint session of the New York legislature today.

A Milwaukee Blast.

MILWAUKEE, Wis, Jan 21.—The German Grocery Company's warehouse was destroyed by fire this morning. The loss will reach seventy-five thousand dollars.

Warehouse Organization.

CHICAGO, Jan 21.—The warehouse men and freight handlers throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico, are to be organized into a union to be called the International Freight-Handlers and Warehousemen's Association.

Wreck and Loss of Life.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Jan. 21.—A terrific hurricane raged along the coast all last night.

A big square-rigged ship went on the reef twenty miles east of here early last night. The life saving station made fruitless attempts all through the night to reach the ship.

With daylight this morning there is no sign of life aboard. All are believed to have been lost.

The name of the ship cannot be ascertained.

CAPITAL CITY CORRESPONDENCE

How Senatorial Fight Carried On—Fair Appropriation Bill Had Opponents in House.

SALM, Jan 20.—The consideration of the appropriation bill for the 1903 fair in the house today brought out a warm discussion. An amendment to the section of the bill appropriating \$500,000 for the enterprise, sought to banter and in fact partially kill the measure, and Davey of Marion, with Jones of Lincoln, made arguments in behalf of the original bill. Gault spoke against the appropriation, while the unanimous vote by which the bill was favorably reported back to the house was not regarded as a test of the strength of its support on final passage, still it was here conceded that the measure would pass, as it did later in the day by an almost unanimous vote.

The vote for senator has cleared up some points and darkened others. The Democratic element will no doubt take no part in electing a Republican to the United States senate from Oregon, all reports to the contrary notwithstanding. Fulton has materially gained votes lately and in due time these will show themselves. It seems sure that at least forty-two votes are for the Clatsop candidate.

Malarkley of Multnomah, Galloway of Yamhill, and Davey of Marion, have entered the arena as orators of the first quality.

Nearly two hundred bills have been introduced in the house alone, and the clerk's desk is pretty well filled up with business. With the efficient chief-clerks who have this work to perform, no mistakes occur and the work of lawmaking goes on apace.

HOP PRICES ARE AGAIN CLIMBING

Many Sales Made at 27 Cents—Thirty Cent Market in Sight, Maybe Forty Cents.

PORTLAND, Jan 20.—The hop market showed additional strength today, and prices again show an upward tendency. A number of sales were made yesterday of fair-sized lots at 27 cents a pound. Some of the brokers, in order to get the choicest stocks, are now offering 27 1/2 cents a pound. There is very little doubt now that hop prices will go up to 30 cents and even above that figure. Even 40 cents a pound is predicted.

President Boardman Resigns.

President H L Boardman of McMinnville College, has resigned the resignation to take effect at the end of the present college year. He was formerly pastor of the Eugene Baptist church and has many friends here.

SENATORIAL CONTEST

Senate and House Voted for Senator in Joint Session Today.

Fulton Gained Three Votes From Yesterday's Ballot—Geer Lost Two.

SALEM, Jan 21.—The House of Representatives and Senate of the Oregon legislature met in joint session for the first time today, as provided for by the state constitution to ballot for a United States senator.

Representative Eddy of Tillamook placed State Senator Fulton of Clatsop in nomination.

Senator Mulkey of Polk placed ex-governor Geer in nomination.

The joint ballot resulted: Fulton.....31 Geer.....18 Wood (Democrat).....17 Scattering [Republicans].....21 Senator Fulton gained three votes from yesterday, Eddy of Tillamook and Yamhill, Huntley of Clackamas, Webster, Clackamas. Geer lost two votes from yesterday's ballot.

THE CONTRACT LET THIS MORNING

The Register Will Print the Pamphlets for the Real Estate Exchange.

The Real Estate Exchange this morning opened bids for the printing of 50,000 pamphlets advertising this section in the East. W C Yoran bid \$635 and the Register \$430. The GUARD did not put in a bid. Work will commence on the pamphlets immediately. They are to be 32 pages with a four-page cover, without advertisements of local firms. The cuts are of fine views, and are furnished by the exchange.
