A participant in a Utah rabbit hunt and a spectator were accidentally shot and killed yesterday. It is not all rabbit at these big drives.

And now a big batch of idols for Korea and China are to be built in this country. Our people have a good many kinds of gods, but this is the first venture in the manufactured line.

And now Oregon statutes are to be burdened with a law against child labor. Not but what it is right, but there is no occasion for it in Oregon. Children under fourteen are not working in factories or at trades here.

A case of unwarranted officialism was that at Portland the other day when a property owner was threatened with arrest for cleaning the mud from in front of his own premises. The street-cleaning department claimed the job. But they were not doing it.

The taxation of the capital stock of a public service corporation, where its value by reason of the ownership of exclusive privileges exceeds that of its tangible property, is perfectly legitimate. But the mercantile corporation enjoys no exclusive privileges, and should not be subjected to unfair taxation.

That was extreme cruelty Representative Galloway, of the Democratic minority, making a speech when his name was called to vote for senator, yesterday, as if he was going to vote for one of the Republican contestants, then finishing by casting his vote for his party candidate. The shock might have resulted fatally if there had been a case of heart disease among the expectant candidates.

Very properly the Marion county grand jury refused to indict a man who drew a check for a gambling debt, then drew his money out of bank before the payee had a chance to present the check for payment. And it is a very poor sort of a gambler that would attempt to have a man indicted for refusing to pay a gambling debt. It is the professionals among them who prize about "bribe" among gamblers, while they rob at every opportunity.

This bill providing for legal executions to take place within the penitentiary enclosure has passed the legislature and awaits the signature of Governor Chamberlain. As there is no emergency clause it will not take effect for ninety days. The circuit court meets in Eugene Monday, March 2nd. As hanging sentences are usually made operative within a month from the date of sentence, it looks as if Sheriff Flax would have the pleasant duty of arranging the hemp cravat about E. E. Lyons' neck.

John D. Rockefeller's agent sent word by letter to not a few senators that Standard Oil was unalterably opposed to trust legislation, then in his letter to Senator Quay, just made public, asked for a meeting at a Washington hotel on the evening of the date of the letter. With one such letter made public others scrambled to get into the bandwagon by telling of the invitations they had to meet the Standard Oil magnate. Of course Mr. Rockefeller depended on those four or five hundred million dollars he is credited as having, to draw the honorable senators to him.

Mr. Quay has largely assisted in making millionaires, but to his credit he seems to place himself in an equivocal position through dealings with this robber of nearly every man, woman and child in these United States.

MENTAL TENSION.

Hard to Realize the Difficulty of Keeping a Natural Pose.
