TO ADVERTISE RESOURCES

Senator Wehring's Bill Passes House—Exhibits May Be Made at State Fair.

Salem, Feb. 13.—Among the senate bills passing the house Wednesday evening was No. 116, by Wehring, providing for the appropriation by the county courts of money out of the general funds for advertising the resources thereof, and making exhibits thereof at county, district and state fairs.

The text of the bill is as follows: "Section 1. That the County Court of each of the several counties of this state be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to appropriate out of the general county fund of such county not otherwise appropriated, such reasonable amount of money, not exceeding the sum of \$1000 annually, as to such court may seem wise and expedient for the printing and distribution of such other forms as may be determined upon for the purpose of advertising and making known the various agricultural, horticultural, mining, manufacturing, commercial and other resources of such county, and for the purpose of making exhibits thereof at county, district and state fairs.

"Sec. 2. Inasmuch as there is a pressing necessity for the taking of immediate steps looking to the effective advertisement of such resources, an emergency therefore is hereby declared to exist, for which reason this act shall take effect and be in force on and after its approval by the governor."

Articles of incorporation of the Champion Basin Mining Co. were filed with County Clerk Lee today.
