WOODMEN HOLD A BIG MEETING

May list the Big Log-Rolling Date—Means Much to Eugene and the County.

The most enthusiastic meeting ever held by the Lane County Woodmen of the World convened in I. O. O. F. hall last night. It was composed of the members of Eugene Camp and of representatives from the other ten camps of the county, and was the culmination of the efforts made for some time past, to get the Woodmen of this County united in a joint "log-rolling." Capt. John M. Williams has been the leader in this movement, with state organizer, Geo. K. Rogers.

Mr. Rogers visited Eugene about six weeks ago. So highly was he impressed with the fraternal enthusiasm of the Lane County "choppers" that a representative of the Head Camp was sent to Eugene. F. G. Woodcock, of Portland, is the man. Invitations were sent to all Lane County Camps to send representatives to a joint committee meeting, which was held last night. Every Camp in the County was represented last night. The local Camp entertained the visiting "choppers" at a banquet, after which the General Committee went into executive session. General Organizer Rogers, presided over the session.
