THE BUSY PHILANTHROPIST.

Governor Chamberlain's answer to the governor of Wisconsin, who requested him to appoint delegates to a convention to be held at Atlanta, Georgia, for discussion of the race question, is to the point:

I will appoint delegates if requested, but am doubtful of beneficial results from such a convention. The South can and will settle the race question, if politicians will give her a chance.

It would be just as appropriate for citizens of the East or South to tell Portland or San Francisco how Chinamen should be treated. Some of these philanthropists have great love for their fellowmen—especially those who are a long way from them.

The Washington legislature passed a bill providing that any corporation could appeal to the courts and procure a stay of the collection of taxes assessed against them pending the decision of the courts as to their validity. Governor McBride would have none of it and vetoed the bill. He well said such a law would permit corporations to hold up payment of their taxes almost indefinitely, besides they were entitled to no better treatment than any other taxpayer.

This is about the season of the year the elk sheds his horns. The specimen in the Portland City Park shed his antlers yesterday. They weigh about forty pounds. The horns are fully regrown by July, when they are in the "velvet." In August they favor the base of some warm sunny bluff where they rub the horns against small trees to polish and harden them for the battles royal of the rutting season in the fall.

And he would not refuse a nomination under such circumstances, even though not a candidate in the true sense of the term.

Jefferson and Adams died within a few hours of each other July 4th, 1826, nearly seventy-seven years ago.

It is estimated that the receipts of the Masonic fair held recently in Rochester, N. Y., exceeded \$50,000.

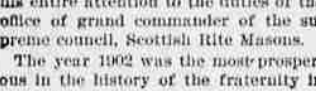
A handsome temple will be erected in Denison, Ia., by the Masons and Knights of Pythias of that place.

Notwithstanding the factional difficulties in the order of Junior United American Mechanics, considerable progress has been made throughout the United States during the last few months.

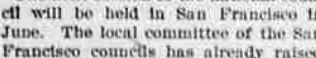
Some eighty new councils have been formed or are in course of being instituted.
