MISSISSIPPI RIVER FLOOD

No Damage Above Memphis--Still Peril for 48 Hours From There to Vicksburg.

Award of a Million Dollars Back-Wages for Coalminers --Carnegie Will Pay His Taxes

MEMPHIS, March 21.--The Mississippi flood is beginning to fall at this point. The danger line is now between here and Vicksburg, where the rise will continue for 48 hours yet.

[Memphis is located in the extreme southwest corner of Tennessee, and Vicksburg about one hundred and eighty miles farther south in Mississippi. New Orleans is still one hundred and eighty miles by the river, south of Vicksburg.--EDITOR GUARD.]

A Million for Miners.

WILKESBARRS, Pa., March 21.--The increase in the wages of miners as granted by the strike commission will give them nearly a million dollars back wages.

Under the agreement under which the miners returned to work the findings of the commission were to become operative from the date of returning to work. The miners returned to work generally about the first of November, therefore the increase of wages allowed by the commission is effective from that date.

The coal companies expect to be able to meet the extra demands on them for wages by or before May 1st.

Andy Carnegie Will Pay.

NEW YORK, May 21.--The tax commissioners of the city and county of New York have been informed that Andrew Carnegie will make no attempt to evade the payment of taxes on his personal property, like other millionaires who claim out-of-town residences. Mr Carnegie's personal property assessment here is \$7,000,000.

NEW YORK, March 21.--The presidents of the coal carrying roads, who have lost about all they contended for by the decision of the Coal Strike commission, without exception decline to discuss the findings of the commission. Strike Commission Report

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.--The report of the anthracite Coal Strike Commission was made public this morning. The miners practically gain all they contended for.

It provides in general for an increase of ten per cent in the rate of wages paid the contract miners; for a reduction of the hours of work for all other than contract labor to eight hours per day.

Other mine workers and water-hoisting engineers will hereafter work in eight-hour shifts. With the reduction in hours of labor they get ten per cent increase of wages.

ANNUAL CONCERT GREAT SUCCESS

University Glee Club Gave the Best Concert Prepared For Several Years.

Last evening in Villard Hall the University of Oregon Glee Club, assisted by the "Next Year" mandolin club, Prof. I. M. Glen, baritone, and Arthur Frazer, pianist, presented the best musical program that has been prepared by the organization for several years. The songs are all new for one thing, and had been well selected with special attention being paid to the needs of music adapted to men's voices.

The divisions of the club are well balanced, excepting for a slight emphasis in first tenor, which is a fault easily borne by an audience. The audience was not as large as it was enthusiastic. Every number on the program was encored vociferously.

One number demanded space for motions and an open arrangement of the singers, in place of the close U-shaped pack, made a much more pleasing effect both in harmony and appearance than the other formation. Several remarked upon this. We think more freedom and volume is available in the extended formation, not to speak of the great improvement of appearance.

The monologue work by Geo. Eyre, was the hit of the evening. Ping Pong, the Chinese Freshman, was the character and Eyre's delineation of the humorous celestial was so pleasing that he was recalled three times.

Prof. Glen's baritone solos were the same acceptable, rich and melodious productions which always delight his audiences.

Mr. Frazer at the piano did work which required three appearances before the audience and an additional number to apprise the audience's expression of appreciation. He continues a prime favorite.

In the Stremlow-Paxton sketch Mr. Frazer and Ross Plummer made a great hit. Frazer's make-up as a young lady and his parodies on the behavior of the gentle hinting sex were extremely funny. They were recalled.

The combined U. O.-Eugene Mandolin Club made an enviable name for itself by playing excellent music. The concert was voted to be the best prepared by the club for many seasons.

Washington, March 21.--Senator Fulton has called at the war department to ascertain the cause of the delay in beginning the improvement at the mouth of the Rioslaw river, under the appropriation of last year.

He was told that the project had become somewhat antiquated, and, because of changes that had taken place at the mouth of the river, had to be revised. This revision has been completed, and, when approved by the board within the next few days, work will be authorized.

Name Dates for Primaries and Convention

Then Hold Pow-wow and Declare War on all Democrats --March 28 for Primaries and April 4 for Convention.

CONVENTION APRIL 4TH.

Saturday following the primaries, April 4th, was set as the date for the county convention. It will be held in Eugene at 2:30 p. m. At this convention delegates to the district convention will be chosen.
