PRESIDENTIAL VICE-PRESIDENTS.

A Philadelphia minister who is more anxious to make a sensation than to speak the truth, in a lecture the other day said that "One week's supply of moral courage by one brave man—Theodore Roosevelt—in the Spanish-American War, fastened the eyes of the state upon him, and led to his ultimate presidency of the United States."

And what of that second place? Let history answer! Except in the early days of the republic the place has been bartered about to anyone who has had prospects for delivering his state vote.

And, elected, the Vice Presidents usually have had a little more influence than the pages in congress in shaping public affairs.

Flatter President Roosevelt as the cycophants may, he has the good sense to realize the nature of the gift—how the presidency came to him through the accident of the pistol bullet, fired by an insane or degenerate hand.

That is good state's rights, the supreme court of Missouri declaring that unless the members of the meat-packer's trust each pays the five thousand dollars fine for illegally combining in defiance of the Missouri trust law, they will be prevented from doing further business in the state.

The Missouri Supreme court's fines against the beef trust, while insignificant from a financial standpoint, have great significance considering the principle involved that state courts may put a curb on the illegal combinations. These trusts are formed to rob the people. That is the plain way to put it. And the state courts are the ones most to be depended upon to correct the evil.

The Register says it "is favorable" to the \$500,000 appropriation for the Portland Lewis and Clark Fair and believes it "should stand."

Mr. E. M. Nighwander has planted an onion patch on the bank of the Jordan. He expects to raise onions for the Jerusalem market.

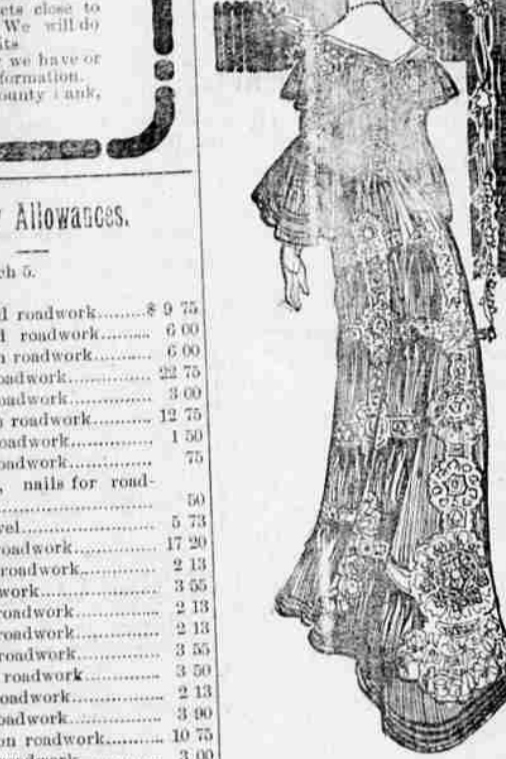
