Mr. Hermann's Ghost.

Corvallis Times.—It seems strange that the Eugene convention should have turned from the bright and blameless young men offered as candidates, to name Mr. Hermann for Congress. Mr. Hermann is ever a genial person, and time was when he was a useful congressman. But a stalking ghost follows him now. It points an accusing finger and asks constantly, "Why, Mr. Hermann, did you quit office under the Roosevelt administration?"

More respect would seem to be due the administration.

Chamberlain, justly receiving the commendation of all people, irrespective of party, and the record of the Democratic party in the recent Legislature, reflect honor upon the party, and will redound to the welfare of the state; we commend their earnest endeavor to curtail public expenditures in the interest of the taxpayers.
