THE HERBARIUM

Thomas Howell, of Oregon City, who has been collecting the flowers of this coast for many years and probably knows more about the flora of this Northwest than any other man, and who has been at work for some time publishing an exhaustive work on the flora, has been appointed field collector and curator of the herbarium of the University of Oregon for the coming year.
