DISPLAYS OUT

The Night Brought to Light Many New Decorations in Honor of the Big Event.

The night brought forth many new windows which are decorated for the coming Woodmen day, Friday, the 15th of this month. The city is gradually taking on a decorated appearance and by Friday morning will be in holiday attire in honor of the big lodge which is to entertain on that date.

Ninth street has come bravely to the front. Miss Saltzman, the milliner, has a pretty camping scene in her window. The items in the scene bear proportion and are very prettily arranged.

M. S. Barker has an unique display, emblematic of the order of which he is a prominent member.

Tolmie & Traver, across the street, have one of their large windows embellished with axe, sledge and wedge.

The Women of Woodcraft are not forgotten. Their tripod and campfire are to be seen in many of the windows.

H. Gordon's forest scene with the big log and logging accoutrements attracts considerable attention from the passersby.

In M. R. Janney's window the lodge is honored with a pretty arrangement of foliage and emblems of the order.

Vincent's drug store has a balance scale with a W. O. W. certificate on one side and a chunk of gold on the other. The certificate outweighs the gold and an inscription announces that W. O. W. is better than the precious metal.

On Willamette street, the new windows are also pleasing. McKinney & Holman's display is a pretty scene of the forest, depicting the various good points of the lodge.

KICKED BY A VICIOUS HORSE

Harvey Copeland Comes Near Losing His Life by a Blow on the Side of His Head

Harvey Copeland, the fourteen-year-old son of James Copeland, was kicked this morning on the right side of his head by a horse which he was attending on East Seventh street. The iron shod hoof of the vicious animal struck the boy's ear and split it to the scalp, extending to the skull and making an ugly wound on the scalp. It was thought that the skull was cracked but the injured lad regained consciousness shortly and was taken to the Courthouse lodging house where the physicians attended him.
