BATTLE OF
THE BALLOTSVoting on Congressional
Candidates Over
the District.Telegraphic Reports Show Little
Interest Being Taken—Reames
Strongly Entrenched and
Has Chance to Win.

Ante-election "returns" from over the district have been pouring in quite lively today. From many points come the news that there is a large per cent of Republicans who have not today seen the inside of an election booth.

With the stay-at-home Republicans, the Democrats working hard for their candidate, many Republicans voting for Reames, Socialists reported lining up for the Democratic man from Jackson, and the probability that Elmore, Prohibition candidate who is a very popular banker, is catching some Republican anti-Hermannites, there can be no other hue to the situation, than that of hope for Reames.

All that Hermann is depending on is the big majority of the district.

LIGHT VOTE.
All over the district the reports come that a light vote is being cast. The country classes do not think it worth the trouble to go any distance to hand one candidate their votes. Even in the cities there is an apathy which amounts to sometimes 40 per cent of the regular vote.

In the four Eugene precincts which have a normal vote of about 1000, 60 per cent had voted at 3 o'clock probably this will be reduced to 35 per cent by the time polls close.

ENCOURAGING REPORTS.
From Salem, Grant's Pass, Corvallis, Junction, Oregon City, Dallas, and even Roseburg, the Guard has received telegrams which say that Reames has a magnificent support and good organization. Hermann people are scarce about the polls and it is evident that there is little active support going on for him.

The finals will be in tomorrow and it is the belief that Reames will make as good a showing as any Democratic candidate who has run in the district for years.

Washington Won Debate.
Friday evening the University of Washington debaters won the platform contest from Oregon. Oregon won the two previous and Washington put forth her mightiest efforts to win this time and succeeded. A national arbitration law was the theme discussed, Oregon maintaining that it was best and Washington on the negative.
