A FIRE THIS AFTERNOON

Roof of Ingham & Zimmer's Vinegar Factory Building Burned.

What might have been a very destructive fire was averted this afternoon by the prompt response of the fire department.

The roof of the Ingham & Zimmer warehouse building on North Pearl street caught fire from a spark of the locomotive of the south-bound local shortly after 2 o'clock.

Workmen around the building saw the fire and attempted to put it out with buckets, but the strong wind spread it rapidly. The alarm was turned in by Contractor Taylor, who was working near, and in a short time the fire was put out, but not before it had burned off nearly the whole of the roof. Nothing was stored in the building at the time or the story might have been different.

The building is the one intended for a vinegar factory and stands within a few yards of the railroad track. It has lately been raised and a new foundation put underneath. The fire today will necessitate a new roof.

There was no insurance on the building. It stands on private ground and the loss will probably have to be born by the S. P. Company. It will be re-covered with a tin roof.
