THE POPE NEAR DEATH

Worst Since illness---
Fixes Thursday Himself
for End of Life.

Tacoma Stenographer Fell Through
Skylight Firebugs Still Operate in Oregon's

Portland, July 13.—Four attempts were made last night in different parts of the city to burn new and expensive residences not yet occupied, but only awaiting the finishing touches of contractors.

As kerosene and naphtha were used to start the fire in every case the police are led to the conclusion that the would-be perpetrators of arson belong to the same gang.

Three unsuccessful attempts were made to burn unfinished residences Saturday night, in one case two men having been seen running from a house where a fire had been started.

The police force and city detectives are alert, but are without the least clue as to the identity of the men.

He now lies in a semi-conscious state.

Cardinal Rampolla, who has been very close to Pope Leo during this illness, says death is very near to the aged Pope.

His Name Will Live.

Portland, Or., July 13.—W. J. Magoon, of this city, originator of the famous Magoon strawberry, is dead. Magoon was the originator of many varieties of strawberries, and was the first to introduce the famous Logan berry in to this state. He was a prominent G. A. R. Two sons survive him. This year he originated the "Black Diamond" strawberry, which he believed would take front rank.

Portland Postoffice

Portland, Or., July 13.—Portland postoffice business is growing fast. Increase in 1903 over 1902, at the end of June 30th, is over \$51,000. This exceeds Seattle's receipt nearly \$5000.

SAM'L WITHROW FOUND DEAD

Had Been Dead at Least a Day
From Natural Causes in Bed
at Home.

Samuel R. Withrow, who has resided near Elmhurst for the past thirty-three years, was found dead in his bed last evening. The cause of his death has been pronounced by a coroner's jury to be natural. It is supposed that he was attacked by heart trouble and passed away, unable to get help. While passing the place late Sunday evening, a young man named Smith noticed that the stock had not been properly attended to, and wondering what was the matter he decided to investigate. Upon forcing an entrance to the house he was confronted by the sight of the dead body of Mr. Withrow in his bed, in position to indicate that he had died after retiring Saturday night.

CORONER HELD INQUEST.

A messenger was sent to Eugene immediately and Coroner C. B. King, accompanied by Undertaker W. T. Gordon, left for the scene. The coroner swore in a jury consisting of the following men: R. M. Trout, W. B. Smith, Bruce Moore, A. T. Fraser, Frank Demming, T. F. Hise. They examined into his death and decided that it was due to natural causes.

OBITUARY.

Samuel R. Withrow was an old time resident of Lane county. He came from Missouri to Oregon and Lane county in 1870 and has since that time been a resident here. He was 69 years of age, respected and honored by all his neighbors.

At the time of his death he was living alone. He had been twice married and the following children survive him: Charles Withrow, Irving, Mrs. Beattie Dougherty, Washington, Clinton W. Withrow, Eugene, is a brother and Mrs. D. R. Lakin and Mrs. M. A. Donaldson sisters of the deceased.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning from the home, with interment beside his deceased wife and daughter in the Inman cemetery.

SUNDAY FIRE ON ELEVENTH STREET

The Home of T. Gordon Partially
Destroyed Yesterday Morning
By the Flames

The congregations of the various churches yesterday were startled by the clang of the fire bell. Three taps directed the department to the east end of the city. The home of T. Gordon, father of H. and W. T. Gordon, was discovered to be on fire. The loss was made by the companies from the central part of town. Cy-clone hose company had a stream of water on the blaze when the others arrived and with the assistance of the chemical soon had control of the fire. The blaze originated through a defective flue and caught in the kitchen roof. Some time was spent fighting the fire before the alarm was sounded, but the water supply became exhausted.

The household goods were removed from the house. Mr. Gordon was at church and did not know of his misfortune until after services. His loss will not be heavy, as it was covered by an insurance of \$200.

ORDERS ARE RECEIVED

How the Oregon National Guard Will be
Arranged.

New Regiment to Consist of
Twelve Companies—Eugene
Companies in Separate
Battalion.

As published by the Guard Saturday the new arrangement of the Oregon National Guard was ordered by the State Military Board. Following is the list of the orders as received by local officers from Adjutant General C. U. Gantenbein:

I. The Brigade organizations, the organizations of the Third and Fourth Regiments are disbanded, to take effect July 15th. Regimental and battalion staff and non-commissioned staff officers continue duties until properly relieved.

II. Companies "A" of the Third Regiment and "H" of the Fourth disbanded, to take effect July 15th.

III. Remaining sixteen companies organized as regiment of twelve companies to be known as the Third Infantry and First Separate Battalion, Infantry.

IV. The sixteen companies of infantry are assigned and designated as follows:
