THE GAMES.

He was unreasonable in all his decisions and would not allow common questions to be asked him by the players of the Eugene team.

The great Jay McCormick of the Salem town was this illustrious individual and the manner of doing was almost the cause of his undoing. When the Sunday game was called there was a bunch of a hundred Eugene men, strong-muscled and determined to see that things were done on the square, watching the umpire for foul dealing, but behold! he saw them there and gave the boys a fair deal.

At yesterday's game there was not the slightest disposition to act smart on his part. There would have been "something doing every minute" and most of it would have been the umpire.

HOW IT WAS SATURDAY.

The twelve inning game Saturday was a spectacle. On the occasion of a raw decision, Tim Shanahan asked the umpire if he meant his decision. "You get out of the game and if you say any more get out of the grounds" was his answer. "We'll win this game under protest" said Somers to the Albany first baseman. The umpire thought it was something about him so he benched Somers. He even ordered them to get out of the grand stand and sit with the other players. At this jolly Somers tipped his hat and McCormick said "That's an insult. You get out of the grounds." And Somers was denied the privilege of seeing the game.

With two of the best men out Eugene held out for twelve innings. The game has been protested and Eugene has good chances to win. CLEAN GAME YESTERDAY. Yesterday the contest in Albany was a pretty one. The presence of a crowd from Eugene made the umpire see where his bread was buttered and he was as good as a baby with his bottle. The runs came in where they should and Eugene scored a pretty victory in nine innings. Kell for Albany made the only run and played an excellent game all around.
