POPE LEO'S BURIAL

Will Take Place as Soon as Arrangements May Be Made.

No Political Strife Among Cardinals - Probable That New Pope Will Not Claim Temporal Power.

(Scripps News Association.) Rome, July 21.—The closing of the long rule of Pope Leo during which temporal power was wrested from the church by King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, will probably see a reconciliation between the Italian government and the Catholic church. No less an authority than Cardinal Svampa made the startling announcement this morning that the new Pope will have a new policy in regard to the temporal power of the Pope that will differ from that which has obtained for centuries. This means that the church will no longer claim other than spiritual dominion, that the long and bitter contest between the church and the Italian government will be ended. Cardinal Svampa also says he believes that a new Pope will easily be elected within ten days.

Measures For Burial.

(Scripps News Association.) Rome, July 21.—A sacred consistory meeting was held today to take preliminary measures for the burial of Pope Leo, which will take place as soon as the set requirements may be filled. The official announcement of death was made this morning.

Seattle's Double Poisoning.

(Scripps News Association.) Seattle, July 21.—The coroner's jury rendered a verdict this forenoon in the inquiry into the death of Mrs. Hull and her infant daughter, which took place very suspiciously. The verdict charges a person or persons unknown to the jury with the crime of murder by poison. Mrs. Hull and her babe both died Thursday of last week, and in great agony.

It is believed by those in a position to have the best understanding of the crime that the mother of the dead woman had a hand in the double murder.

New-paper Detectives.

(Scripps News Association.) Portland, July 21.—The identity of the man who murdered Calof, the fruit peddler, here two weeks ago is now known.

It is certain that Jim Haley and a man called "Doughnuts" are the guilty parties. Both have completely disappeared.

The police are demoralized and seem to be unable to follow the trails left by criminals. The Daily Journal is sparing no expense in the search for the gang of holdups that have been terrorizing the city.

War will be waged against the police for neglect of duty until a thorough reorganization of the force is compelled.

Sunday's Game to be Witnessed by Eugene Fans in Carload Lots—Sign Up.

E. J. McClanahan has fathered a very popular scheme—that of an excursion to Salem next Sunday, with a primary object of allowing the visitors to see the battle of the giants on the diamond on that date, which will be the last time this season that Eugene and Salem cross bats.

Probably 150 can be secured to attend from Eugene. Others along the line will join the train into Salem and the project would be patronized to the limit without a doubt.

Mr. McClanahan has made application to the company for lower than the regular rates.

TODAY'S NEWS.

The Evening Paper Gives it Fresh - The Morning Paper Gives Yesterday's News.

Though the Daily Guard published the fact of the death of Pope Leo two live hours before the Register, the latter paper does not fail to advertise itself with the announcement that "The first news of the death of Pope Leo was received in Eugene in an Associated Press dispatch to the Register."

Granting the statement, what good was the news if the Register had to wait many hours before it could be laid before its readers?

Therein lies the advantage of the evening publication, especially on this Pacific coast, over its morning contemporary. Pope Leo died at four minutes past four in the afternoon. It was then eleven o'clock in the forenoon in Eugene. Even had he survived till nine o'clock yesterday evening the Daily Guard of yesterday would have given the news.

The day is well over in Europe—all the news is made long before the evening paper on the Pacific coast is even thinking about going to press. And on this coast the evening publication has the advantage of the news from the Mississippi valley and the Atlantic coast till six and seven o'clock in the evening respectively. That is when it is four o'clock in the afternoon in Eugene, it is six o'clock in Chicago and seven o'clock in New York.

The news of the day throughout Europe and the east is made in time for publication in the Pacific coast evening papers. The morning papers refresh it.

And it is not different with home-local news. The evening paper gives the main happenings of the day. The morning paper has no choice but to print the news of the day before.

LUCKY BOY MINE

IMPROVEMENTS

Right of Way Secured for Ditch and Electric Wires on Blue River.

Records in the county clerk's office show that yesterday L. E. Bean and others who own property in the Blue River district, have deeded a right of way 100 feet wide without the timber on the lands to the Lucky Boy Mining company.

This is but another step in the work which has been going on all summer at the Lucky Boy headquarters in the Blue River district. The intentions of the officials of the company have been published in these columns before. The plans include an immense amount of improvement on their property and it is gratifying to know that the work is rushing along in actual fact as well as on paper.

L. Zimmerman came up from Portland yesterday on business connected with the company and F. C. Sharkey arrived from the mines. The gentlemen have been in conference over the business and are satisfied with the progress made so far in the improvements.

The right of way secured will be used for the construction of a ditch which will convey water for power and for the erection of the poles to support the wires for the transmission of electricity from their big power station under course of construction.

COBURG BRIDGE OVER MCKENZIE

Closed for Repairs, Rotten and Unsafe—A Big Job.

Judge Kincaid received a message from Coburg this morning stating that the approach and small span to the wagon bridge across the McKenzie, near Coburg, had given away.

Judge Kincaid immediately drove over to inspect the same and found that the road supervisor had blockaded and closed the bridge to travel. The small span had settled the piling which supported it being in a rotten condition. The timbers that must be replaced are 104 feet long and will probably have to be hewed out.

It will probably be eight or ten days before travel can be resumed. Under the small span the river is swift and deep and false work will have to be used.

Judge Kincaid says many teams and people are on this side of the break and very anxious to get home, but that travel cannot be resumed till repairs are made.

L. N. Roney, the well known contractor, built this approach about five years ago. It is thought that the court will have Mr. Roney make the necessary repairs, if he can possibly spare the time to do so.

Later—it is probable that G. W. Taylor, the houseowner, will be secured to make repairs, it being impossible for Mr. Roney to leave other work, although Mr. Somers, the bridge man, may possibly be employed. Judge Kincaid informs us that the Wendling Booth-Kelly mill will saw the necessary timbers.

INFORMATION

IS NOT CORRECT

Roseburg Says Turner Has Decided to Call Eugene-Albany Game.

The Roseburg papers both seem to be misinformed of the state of protests before President G. M. Turner of the Valley League. The protest put in by Albany about the Fourth of July game where the umpire changed a decision affecting the score is commented on as follows:

"President Turner of the Willamette Valley League has decided that one game between Eugene and Albany where the umpire changed his decision will have to be played over again and thus Roseburg and Eugene are a tie for second place. Eugene and Roseburg each have two postponed games to play while Salem and Albany each have one."

President Turner was in Eugene Sunday and stated to members of the Eugene team that he thought that the best thing to do would be to drop all protests, allowing the scores to stand as they are.

None of the Eugene players or officials have heard of any such decision as printed by the Roseburg papers. The statement is probably made to arouse enthusiasm in Roseburg because it ties Eugene and Roseburg in the percentage column with 50 each.

MESSAGE FROM TURNER

The Salem Statesman of this morning also had the rumor that the Fourth of July game had been thrown out. The Guard called President Turner up in Albany this afternoon and he stated positively that the game protests had not been decided and that he was working on the evidence submitted. The decisions will be mailed tonight or tomorrow to the respective teams. The three protests in which Eugene is interested will then be settled.
