The Seattle coroner had five cases Thursday, three deaths from accident, one suicide and one murder. Of course the local reporters on the newspapers were kept busy too.

The largest tree in Oregon was felled recently to be sent as a curiosity to the World's fair. It is the Aberdeen spruce and stood nearly 300 feet from the ground and 118 feet from the ground to the first limb. Its age is calculated at 440 years, being a good sized tree when Columbus discovered the land that was afterwards called America.

Americans will appreciate the decision of the British government to maintain a force of 25,000 troops in South Africa "as a reserve for the defense of India." The supreme court of Walla Walla, Washington, made a sweeping order the other day that thirty-seven residents should be debarred the privilege of purchasing strong drink under penalties of the habitual drunkard law. Some of the beneficiaries of the order complained, while others expressed themselves satisfied with the protection thrown about them.

A number of women of Pittsburg have inaugurated a new method of improving the slums of that city. They have organized and incorporated a stock company capitalized at \$20,000, and they are to build a model tenement house at some suitable place in the slums, fill it with typical residents of the neighborhood and proceed to give an object lesson in sanitary living.

Two photographers from San Francisco are in Astoria for the purpose of taking photographs of the salmon industry for a moving picture exhibit. They visited all of the canneries the other day and decided just what will be the most interesting in the collections. Six or eight will be placed in the canneries selected, and just as soon as a good run of fish is reported and the fishermen bring in their hauls the photographers will get to work. It is intended to exhibit the pictures all over the United States, and particularly in the east. It will make an interesting picture.

NOTICE TO TEACHERS.

The annual county Teachers Institute for the year 1903, will be held in Eugene at the county court house, beginning at 9 o'clock a. m., Tuesday August 5th, 1903, and continuing two days.

All teachers are required by law, to attend this institute on penalty of having their certificates revoked or grades lowered. Section 29-3, Oregon School Laws says in part: he, (the County School Superintendent) shall apportion in October, to each district in his county, \$5. for each teacher employed by such district during the twelve months immediately preceding such apportionment, who has attended, for a period of at least sixteen hours, an annual county institute or state teacher's association, held during the twelve months immediately preceding the time of making such apportionment."

The instructors at the institute will be Hon. B. F. Mulkey, President Ashland Normal school; Prof. D. A. Grout, now President of the Western Division of the State Teachers Association; Sept. J. H. Ackerman and others.

Some of the ablest educators in Oregon will be in attendance. The work of the institute will be first-class and the teachers attending can be sure of an interesting and profitable meeting.
