Lane county's place in Oregon is again demonstrated by the apportionment of school funds from the state treasury. Multnomah leads with an apportionment of \$15,054.40 for 28,159 students. Marion county comes second with an apportionment of \$15,796 for 9,873 students. Lane stands third with \$13,272 apportioned for 8,255 students. Clackamas is number four and Linn county five in the order of amounts. Lane county is but \$2,500 behind Marion and in a few years will be second in population in the state of Oregon. Oregon has 143,757 school children and pays \$230,011.20 this year for their instruction.
