HORACE McKINLEY RETURNS TO COAST

Had No Intention to Jump His Bail—An Injustice to Miss Ware.

Portland Telegram: Horace G. McKinley, who with former United States Commissioner Miss Marie Ware, must answer to the next Federal Grand Jury on a charge of conspiring to defraud the Government out of public lands by forging the names of fictitious entrymen, has returned to Portland.
This is as was predicted by his friends and attorneys, but there was a newspaper report at the time of his departure to the effect that the well-known timber man had left the country with no intention of ever returning to face his accusers on the pending charge.
Mr. McKinley was seen at the office of Judge O'Day this morning. He laughed at the report circulated to the effect that he had skipped out and gave it to be understood that he had no such intention. He went East merely on business, he said, and had returned when the purposes of the trip had been accomplished.
"It was said in the papers that I had gone with Miss Ware when I left here the last of June. I do not care so much what was said about me, because a man can stand it, but this was very unjust to Miss Ware. Of course it was necessary that we both be here at the preliminary examination, after which I went East with some Wisconsin friends, Haskell Wilhee and his wife. Mr. Wilhee owns at least 30,000 acres of timber land in Oregon, which I have sold him, and we went East together, via the Northern Pacific, leaving here the last of June.
"When I left here Miss Ware was in the city, although I knew that she expected to go to Denver, where she now is. I have not seen her since I left here. I think she remained in Portland two or three days after I left."
