

SECRETARY HAY

ed Away Quietly at Early Hour This Morning

Successor Is Choate—Lodge, and Prof. Moore Also Mentioned in This Connection

Secretary H. H. Hay, July 1.—Secretary of John Hay died at 12:25 this morning. The signs immediately preceding death were those of pulmonary failure. The attending physicians beyond a difficulty in breathing, there was no struggle in the final moments. Stimulants were administered but produced no effect. After a short unconsciousness Hay passed away.

London, July 1.—The death of John Hay, who future historians will describe as the greatest secret of state the country ever had, caused profound grief here. It is believed that his European trip had done him to comparatively good. The recent attack of pneumonia, which was thought to be only a cold. The fact is Secretary Hay was a sufferer from heart trouble for many years.

London, July 1.—Secretary Hay's death will be held from the residence of Samuel Mather, brother-in-law of John Hay, in this city, with burial in Lakeview cemetery.

London, July 1.—President Wilson learned of the death of Secretary Hay at 3:30 this morning, the news being brought to Sagamore Hill by a messenger from the village. The president is inexpressibly shocked by the intelligence. He had hoped that he would be able to resume his duties in the state department in the event of the death of Hay the president that he has lost a personal friend and the country a master. It is thought here that the president will attend the funeral at Cleveland, the second former home.

TOOZE GETS THE HONORS

Woodburn Man Appointed Delegate to National Fraternal Congress

Hon. Walter L. Tooze, of Woodburn, has been appointed by Hon. L. L. Book, head consul of the Woodmen of the World of the Pacific jurisdiction, as the Oregon representative to the National Congress, to be held at Macinac Island, Michigan, August 23, 1905.

The other four delegates to the Fraternal Congress will come from the other eight Western states of the jurisdiction. This is an appointment which carries with it the highest honors of the order in the West. Walter L. Tooze was a delegate to the head camp session at Salt Lake City in 1900, also a delegate to the head camp session of 1903 at Los Angeles. He has attended nearly all of the district conventions in Oregon as a delegate for the past ten years and has unflinchingly stood for the principles of strict economy in the conduct of the affairs of the order. For years past he has delivered many unweaving orations for the benefit of the order in Oregon.
