CELEBRATION BIG SUCCESS

Immense Crowds in the City Enjoyed the Festivities

The streets of Eugene presented a gay appearance early in the day as gaily bedecked lads and lasses accompanied by their fond parents tramped up and down the streets which had been fittingly arrayed for the occasion in flags and bunting stopped in the many fashionable stores for refreshments or rest or received their wants from the various stands around the park.

THE PARADE

At 10 o'clock the streets were one mass of humanity, patiently waiting for the street parade which by the way was the best seen here for a long time. There was much rivalry between the different fire companies of the city for the two prizes for the best decorated cart and the best percentage on parade. In the first the Cyclones captured the honor, with Oregon second. The percentage prize has not yet been awarded. Immediately following the parade the morning's program was carried out in the park.

IN THE AFTERNOON

Speaking of the parade it was the longest seen at a celebration here for many years.
