SERIOUS REVOLVER ACCIDENT

Alfred Pleuard of Low-
ell Shot Through the
Stomach

Revolver Accidentally Discharged
While Being Handed to Him
By His Sister— Happened
Yesterday

Alfred Pleuard, a logger by occupa-
tion, lies almost at the point of death
at his home near Lowell, 20 miles east
of Eugene, as a result of being ac-
cidentally shot in the stomach with a
22 calibre revolver yesterday after-
noon between one and two o'clock.

Pleuard, who is aged about 35 years
and lives with his mother and broth-
ers and sisters, had been having
trouble with squirrels destroying
his garden. He had been shooting at
the rodents with his old revolver and
left it lying on the ground in the
garden. His sister picked it up and
was in the act of handing it to him
when in some manner it was dis-
charged, the bullet passing through
his stomach and through the lower
lobe of the left lung, lodging near the
spine.

The injured man was cared for as
best possible by the family, and Dr.
L. W. Brown of Eugene, sent for.
The doctor found him in a bad con-
dition and today stated to a Guard
reporter that the wound was a very
serious one.
