PAST WEEK WITH GROWING CROPS

Weather Has Been Very Favorable for Normal Growth-- Hop Lice are Thick

From the regular bulletin issued by the Oregon weather bureau for the week ending July 4:

The past week has been favorable for normal growth, notwithstanding it averaged cooler than usual. Haying is now general and, although considerable hay was cut and lying in the fields when the rains of the early part of the week occurred, no great damage ensued, and the hay crop promises to be unusually heavy and of excellent quality. Fall wheat continues to fill nicely and its harvest will begin in about ten days or two weeks. Fungus diseases and insect pests are more troublesome than usual at this season of the year. Spring wheat in portions of the Willamette valley is badly infested with aphids, but otherwise its condition is promising. Oats are affected by a red rust fungus, which is causing much apprehension. Barley is ripening nicely. Corn, gardens, potatoes, field onions and sugar beets continue doing well. Many lice are reported in the hop yards, especially those situated near the river bottoms, and preparations for extensive spraying have been made, which will be put in operation if the present warm and bright weather does not cause their disappearance. Berries are plentiful, and other fruit has made satisfactory advancement.

Local Militia Companies Will Participate at Gearhart Park

The members of companies A and C, First Separate Battalion, O. N. O., of this city are making active preparations to participate in the encampment of all the state troops at Gearhart Park, on the coast south of Astoria, lasting a week or ten days beginning on Thursday, July 13. Co. A will send down 41 or 42 enlisted men, under the command of First Lieutenant Raymond Bath, Captain C. C. Hammond being detailed as captain of the Lewis and Clark expedition guards. John M. Renne is second lieutenant.

Co. C will send 44 enlisted men under Captain J. M. Williams. First Lieutenant G. W. Willoughby and Second Lieutenant Henry L. Aker will both probably go along.

The companies have been holding extra drills on the streets for some time past getting in shape to make a good appearance at the encampment.

EXTENSION OF C. & E. RAILROAD

Project Now Said to Have Taken Definite Shape.

So Says A. B. Hammond, Owner of the Road--Will Extend Across the State to Vale

"Talk of extending the Corvallis & Eastern on to Vale has been premature up to this time, but I now feel the project has taken definite shape," said A. B. Hammond, the well known California capitalist, when seen today regarding the continuation of that line, which has been promised so long. "There are too many roads on paper now, and we will not give out details of our plans until everything has been determined, so work can proceed." Speaking further, Mr. Hammond dwelt on the changes in the state of late years, and from the tenor of his remarks it was inferred that previously he had doubts as to the policy of building the additional trackage. He stated that the project had been permitted to die, and while he admitted he was not familiar with the progress which had been made of late in the preparations, his manner indicated plainly that words that the company is about to launch forth and clear the way for the main line through the promising lands in the eastern part of the state.—Telegram.
