Leave Without Parents Knowledge for Portland—The Two Are First Cousins

Cute more the oft repeated quotation, "love will find a way," has proven true. This time there comes to the Guard a report from Portland saying that Harry Lough and Miss Susie Stanley, both of this city, are married, having run away from here when parents opposed marriage and were married on the high seas, the ceremony being performed by Captain Edward Johnson, of the steamer Cascade, when off Point Blanco on July 6th.

Miss Stanley has until the last week occupied the position of second cook at the Smeede Hotel, and is favorably known. Her parents reside across the river on North Washington street, and it was here that a Guard reporter learned the particulars of the affair. Harry Lough, the young man in the case, came here from Illinois about a year ago and has since been employed in the Linton hopyard near this city. Soon after his arrival here he began paying marked attention to Miss Stanley, and the fact that they were first cousins excited no comment, nor was it given any thought by the girl's parents until recently. JOSEPHINE MELONS HURT BY PEST

So Far Five Per Cent of Crop Killed by Mysterious Insect

The melon crop of Josephine county, until within the last few days, gave promise of a big yield. Some kind of a pest, however, has attacked the vines, and the melon growers have not as yet been able to determine what it is that is causing the damage. A vine will be in perfect vigor and within 24 hours will begin to wither and dry up, and will be entirely dead within two days.

No insect can be observed on the leaves, vines or roots, nor can a larva be found in the vine or roots. A small black bug is found in the ground about the roots of some of the diseased vines, but it does not appear to feed on or molest the roots.

There are over 300 acres in melons in Josephine county this season, and already 5 per cent of this acreage has been killed by this new pest. Growers expected to have fully 150 cars for shipment to Portland and other northern markets, but unless some way is found of destroying the pest the crop will be a failure.
