TERRORISTS WARN TREPPOFF

Expects to Be Killed But Nerve Is Unshaken

Will Be "Executed in Your Own Room and Will Die in Your Bed" Is Message Sent Minister

St. Petersburg, July 13.—M. Bonligan will shortly resign as minister of the interior and will be succeeded by Trepoff. The terrorists have renewed a warning against Trepoff, who is constantly receiving letters telling him his end is near. Trepoff makes no concealment of the fact that he expects to be killed, but his nerve is unshaken. Letters from the terrorists say: "Your sentence will be executed in your own room. You will die in your bed."

PRESIDENT MEETS BARON ROSEN

Secretary Loeb and Mrs. Loeb start on their vacation Sunday and will spend the month fishing in the Feton Mountain country, south of Yellowstone Park.

POWDER WORKS EXPLOSION

Eight Men Were Blown Into Mangled Atoms

Hole Forty Feet Deep Exists Where Mixing House Stood - Building Completely Ruined

Point Richmond, Cal., July 13.—Eight men were killed in an explosion that destroyed the mixing house of the Giant Powder Works at Sebrante, 5 miles northeast of here, this morning. A Chinaman standing 90 feet from the mixing house was badly injured, but will recover. The mixing house structure, 40x40, and two smaller buildings nearby were completely razed. The explosion dug a hole beneath the mixing house fully forty feet deep. The bodies of the men killed were horribly mangled, arms, legs and trunks being hurled into the bay. Three trunks were found near the demolished buildings, but the others are undoubtedly lost beyond recovery.

WILL SHIP SUGAR OVER NEW LINE

American and Hawaiian Steamship Will Give All Business to Mexican Company

New York, July 13.—The American and Hawaiian Steamship Company closed a contract with the Tehuantepec and National R. R. Co. of Mexico, for the transportation of all the business of the company between the Atlantic and Pacific over the railroad, which will be completed next year. President Deamorn says his company, which largely controls the transportation of sugar from the islands to the United States, has ordered two new steamers from the Union Iron Works, at San Francisco, the vessels to have a capacity of 12,300 tons, a speed of 12 1/2 knots, and to burn oil.

PORTLAND RAILWAYS

May Be Sold to the City and Be Operated Under Municipal Ownership

Portland, July 12.—Richard Corneilus, president of the San Francisco division of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Elevated Railway Employees, and a member of the national labor organization, arrived here today. He claims that he comes to effect municipal ownership of the Portland street car lines.

This announcement has caused great excitement in this city, and is part of a general movement to accomplish public ownership of street car lines in all the larger cities of the country. It is believed that the Eastern syndicate which recently bought the Portland system is desirous of unloading the same on the community as soon as the Lewis and Clark fair is over.

COULD NOT LIVE ON \$7,500 PER ANNUM

Paris, July 13.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg says that the declaration of M. Muraviev to head the Russian peace commission is partly due to ill health and partly to the fact that an allowance of \$7500 is insufficient, owing to a greater cost of living in the United States.

STANDS BY HER STATEMENT

Miss Ida M. Tarbell Answers Recent Refutation

Reiterates Charges Against Rockefeller and Judges Him by the Golden Rule—Might Makes Right

New York, July 13.—Miss Ida M. Tarbell today made a reply to the recent refutation by Attorney Kline, of Cleveland, of her charges against Rockefeller in the Corrigan case. "I see nothing in Kline's statement to make me revise what I have written in the case of Corrigan vs. Rockefeller," she said. After reiterating the charges against Rockefeller she said: "I did not accuse Rockefeller of breaking the law or even the rules of business as they seem to be interpreted by many business men. I judged him by the golden rule and I claim Rockefeller himself gives me the right to use that rule in estimating his character. If Rockefeller had not all his life publicly declared that the church and Bible were the most precious things in his life I should hesitate to apply the golden rule in the Corrigan case. In Rockefeller's practice mutual helpfulness has no place. Might makes right. It is not generosity, justice nor humanity."

THE FRENCH HAVE EXCITEMENT

Paris, July 13.—The chamber of deputies was the scene of great disorder today during the discussion of the bill granting amnesty to those condemned in connection with the revolutionary conspiracy of 1899. The bill passed the senate Tuesday morning. During the course of a sensational debate Minister of War Boreaux announced that he withdrew his signature from the amnesty project. President Doumer adjourned the chamber amidst an uproar.

FACTS IN OIL CONTROVERSY

Standard and Republic Loaned Each Other Horses

The Great Oil Octopus Directed the Small Company When to Raise or Lower Prices

Kansas City, July 13.—In the proceedings against the Standard, Waters, Pierce and Republic Oil Companies today a former employe of the Republic Company testified that the statement of the concern was made up in Cleveland and that the oil came from the Standard's refinery at Whiting. Witness said he received orders to raise or lower prices from the local manager of the Standard. Salesmen were instructed not to fight the Standard, but the independent companies.

A. C. Shires, former assistant manager of the Republic in Kansas City, testified that rebates were given twenty-five customers for about six months. Rebates ran from \$6 to \$40 a month to dealers whose trade was sought. He told how the Standard and Republic transferred oil to each other and borrowed each other's horses. The next hearing will be held at Joplin, Mo.

MIKADO'S SOLDIERS WANT PEACE

Plague and Cholera Have Appeared Among the Japanese

Siping, Manchuria, July 13.—The situation at the front is unchanged. The Japanese are still moving in Korea and Russian trains move as far as Chang Ta Fu. It is reported that the Japanese soldiers are anxious for peace, and that Oyama is continually issuing an appeal to the men in order to counteract this feeling. The Chinese are burying the decaying corpses buried in the shallow graves after the battle of Mukden have created a terrible condition. Plague and cholera have appeared among the Japanese.
