SENATOR BOOTH
DENIES STORY

That Christian Federation Will
Take Over Booth-Kelly Co.
Holdings

State Senator R. A. Booth, of the
Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., today in-
formed the Guard that there is not a
semblance of truth in the report, as
published in last evening's Portland
Telegram and this morning's Eugene
Register, that the Booth-Kelly Co.
would sell its sawmills and vast tracts
of timber and other lands to the Co-
operative Christian Federation. He
further stated that no such idea ever
entered the minds of the stockholders
of the company and that it was a
great surprise to him to read such an
item in the papers mentioned.
The Co-operative Christian Federa-
tion, promoted by a well known for-
mer Lane county preacher, H. S.
Wallace, is thought by many to be a
wild-goose scheme. Wallace has been
working on it for several years, and
from time to time the Guard has
spoken of the matter.

LEFT HIS WIFE

And She Sues Him for Divorce
—She is a Resident of
Florence

Mrs. Lillab McLennan, of Florence,
Lane county, is the plaintiff in a di-
vorce suit just filed in the
circuit court by her attorney
L. E. Bean. Mrs. McLennan
says she was married to W. G.
McLennan at Roseland, B. C., on
May 14, 1901, and that she has
been a resident of Lane county for
more than a year past; that in Jan-
uary, 1904, her husband, without
cause or provocation, deserted her and
has since remained away and refused
and neglected to provide for her;
that since he left she has been com-
pelled to work out and earn her own
living.
