John P. Wilbur Writes
That Plant Will
Again Run
Will Commence About Septem-
ber 15 or October 1—Good
News to Eugene
People.

F. E. Dunn, the well-known dry
goods merchant, Saturday afternoon
received a letter from John P. Wilbur,
of Union, who with Will Wright pur-
chased the local woollen mill plant
early last spring, stating that in all
probability he would operate the mill
this fall, beginning about September
15th or October 1st.
It will be remembered that at the
time Messrs. Wilbur and Wright pur-
chased the plant they announced that
they would soon afterward operate it.
Hood River people wanted the mill,
however, and negotiations were en-
tered into for its removal to that city,
the citizens there offering a good-
sized bonus. The deal fell through,
and the mill has been idle since.
The announcement that the mill
will be operated once more is good
news to the people of Eugene. It will
give employment to a large number of
persons, thereby increasing the pros-
perity of the city. Every encourage-
ment should be given the owners of
the plant in their determination to
resume operations.
