BINGER'S
PLACE

I. H. Bingham of Lane
County Mentioned
Prominently.

Marion County Has Four Aspir-
ants With W. L. Toozie a Fa-
vorite - Vawter of Med-
ford a Candidate.

The men mentioned thus far as possible successors of the hand-shaking Binger are eight in number, and come from four counties. Of these eight the two from Washington county, E. W. Haines, of Forest Grove, and S. B. Huston, of Hillsboro, are not open candidates, their names merely having been mentioned as possibilities. Of those said to be in active training for the race, Walter L. Toozie, of Marion county, is probably best known. As chairman of the congressional committee which so successfully conducted Binger Hermann's campaign last year, Mr. Toozie became acquainted over the entire first district—in fact, delivered political speeches in most of the counties in the district. This will possibly put the pool-selling slightly in his favor on the start. But from Marion county come the additional names of C. E. Moores, W. C. Hawley and E. Hofer. Presumably all these men have some following in their home county, which induces them to consider entering the race, and if this is so, it will crowd Mr Toozie some in his enjoyment of the inside track at the start.

I. H. BINGHAM TO THE FORE.
From Lane county comes the report that I. H. Bingham, of Eugene, will be in the running. Before the last session of the Legislature Mr. Bingham was not widely known in the first district in any but a business way, but his record in that only brings him to the limelight as a strong man for the place. Although on the losing side in the organization of the lower house, Mr. Bingham developed into one of the strongest personalities on the floor, and showed keen political acumen and power of organization. With Lane county solidly behind him Bingham will have one of the strongest Republican votes in the district to start with, and under the direct primary nominations law that means much. The extreme southern part of the district will have an aspirant in the person of W. L. Vawter, of Medford. Mr. Vawter has been in one congressional campaign, and as chairman of the ways and means committee in the lower house during the last legislature he had great influence and became widely known.—Telegram.

GAUGING STATIONS

THE NEW BIJOU
THEATRE FOR RENT

Fred Merrill Wants to Rent or
Sell Lease For the
Vaudeville.

Fred T. Merrill arrived in Eugene late Sunday night. He says any one that wants the lease of the Bijou can have it. "We have not been treated fairly," says Mr. Merrill, "and in consequence we cannot run our little theatre without a loss. On account of no electricity in the afternoon no matinees can be given, and irrespective of our rights, and to satisfy a few puritanical people, the council forbade our Sunday night concerts. These three items make a difference to us of \$50 or \$60 per week, just what we are losing at this time. A further hardship is put on us by the council with a \$100 license, the same amount paid by the opera house, which charges \$1, \$2, and sometimes \$5 admission, and which plays shows on a percentage, with no risk whatever.

"It is absurd to charge us \$100 for running a 10-cent theatre when they only charge that amount in San Francisco and other large cities where they run continuously afternoon and evening and take in more money Saturday afternoon than we take in in a whole week. High rent, high license and expensive attractions which we always employ are driving us out of business in your city, which of course would suit the lessees of the opera house, who are not anxious for the general public to become educated to 10-cent theatres."

"The little Bijou gives a metropolitan air to Eugene, which is noticed by all strangers. Up to date not a dime has been taken out of the city. In fact, we have had to send money here to pay rent and other expenses, and we add from 10 to 12 people each week to the population and all employees spend their money right here, while with the big shows they carry away hundreds of dollars and do not even stay in town over night.

"We ask the public who have visited both theatres which of the two gives the most refined show. We ask them if they have ever seen or heard a thing suggestive in any vaudeville performance at the Bijou?"

"We cannot run here and lose money. It is simply up to the council, the landlord and the people. If they want us here they will treat us right. If they do not want us here we will close up shop and lease out our building."
