AND WATER
PLANTS

City Employs Engineer
to Make Estimates
of Cost

F. C. Kelsay, of Salt Lake, Will
Report to Council Committee
on September First—Pre-
liminary Surveys Made

A. C. Reese, special agent of Frank
C. Kelsay, constructing engineer, of
Salt Lake, met with a committee
from the Eugene city council last
night and the matter of municipal
ownership of electric light and water
plants was discussed.

As the outcome of the meeting Mr.
Kelsay, through his agent, was em-
ployed to make estimates on the cost
of such plants, to report to the com-
mittee on September 1st.

Municipal ownership of public
utilities is rapidly getting to be a
popular idea among Eugene people,
and it promises to be a reality before
any great length of time. The city
has already filed upon the waters of
the McKenzie river above Leaburg for
the purpose of securing power for the
electric plant, and preliminary sur-
veys have been made for the canal and
power site.
