PATENT HEDGE TRIMMER

River Distances

Considerable inquiry has been made as to the distances between points on the Willamette by water. The following table is according to the government survey:
Eugene to Harrisburg.....20 miles
Harrisburg to Peoria.....20 1/2 miles
Peoria to Corvallis.....12 1/2 miles
Corvallis to Albany.....12 1/2 miles
Albany to Salem.....34 miles
Salem to Portland.....72 miles
This makes the distance from Eugene to Albany 65 1/2 miles, Harrisburg to Albany 45 1/2 miles, Peoria to Albany 24 miles.—Albany Democrat.
According to the above Eugene is 171 1/2 miles distant from Portland by the river. It is 123 miles by rail.
