**Root as a Possibility.**

The political wisecracks are now predicting that Elihu Root will be Roosevelt's choice for the next Republican nomination for the presidency. The subject of the presidency is always an interesting one to American citizens and when a new possibility comes into prominence or a move is made to bring a particular man into the limelight, it is but natural that the press should deal with the subject.  
 It is not certain, however, that Root is to have the backing of Roosevelt, or that the president has at this early day set about aiding any of the aspirants to secure the coveted prize. The list of eligibles so far mentioned is a limited one, being practically confined to Fairbanks, Root, Taft, Cretelyou and Foraker. There are indications that W. Murray Crane, former governor of Massachusetts and accounted the wildest politician in all the New England states, has inaugurated a still hunt for delegates. If so, he will be found a factor to be dealt with.

According to a Russian medical investigator, the Japanese are using the most harmless bullet that was ever fired from a rifle—comparatively harmless, that is, in its after effects. Instead of using dum-dum bullets of the deadly type surreptitiously brought into use in the Boer war, or of resorting to poisoned bullets, the Japanese have provided themselves with rifles the bore of which is so small and the velocity of the bullet so great that the bullet in its flight gathers heat, which enables it to act as a germicide. The effect of the fire is to produce anesthesia rather than a painful, lingering death. The bullet used by the Japanese makes a scarcely noticeable penetration in the tissue without tearing, and a little red spot as of an insect bite tells the cause of coma of the wounded.

**Bennington Boiler Explosion**

ously been sent to the latter institutions to prepare for the reception of the wounded.  
 The scene on board the Bennington when it reached the wharf was frightful. Deck timbers, heavy steel and iron beams, smokestacks, gun carriages, scraps of engines and boilers were heaped in one indiscriminate mass. Two of the guns were gone and the magazine, which exploded almost simultaneously with the boiler, was nothing more than a great gaping hole. The plateau buckled and the inner woodwork in places was torn to splinters. Much of the upper works was thrown into the water.

The ship is now leaking rapidly and will sink. The cause of the explosion has not been definitely ascertained. Engineer Nelson was personally making an inspection of the boiler preliminary to leaving port. He found everything all right and was about to give orders to put on steam when the explosion occurred. Nelson was blown back into the storeroom and injured, but not fatally. The captain and a few other officers had not yet joined the ship, and thus escaped. Ensign Perry was on the forward deck directly above the boiler and was fatally injured. Other officers were injured, but none fatally. The engine crew were all at their places when the explosion occurred, which was followed by the outpouring of a sheet of flame, scalding water and smoke. This caught every man in the boiler and engine rooms, blew up the decks and threw dozens of men into the air and into the bay. In the panic others jumped into the bay and were picked up by the boats.

In going aboard the ship it was necessary to step over the bodies of three dead boys. Those sailors who remained in a condition to walk about behaved in a heroic manner and did not stop until every badly injured man had been sent ashore in launches.  
 The scenes at the morgue and hospitals are terrible. Victims are blackened by cinders and smeared with blood. Very few are badly torn, the injuries in most cases being from scalding water. In many cases the skin hung in ribbons. Some of the injured are so blackened and scalded that they could not be identified by their friends. Among the identified dead are sailors Chambers, Newcomb, Hughes and Benell.

**BALFOUR NOT LIKELY TO RESIGN**

Expected Government Will be Sustained on Vote Monday—How Papers Stand  
 (Scripps News Service.)  
 London, July 21.—After a half hour's session this morning the house of commons adjourned until Monday to await the government decision regarding the future course in view of the defeat of the ministry bill to reduce the appropriation for the Irish land commission. It is not believed that Balfour will resign, and it is expected that the government will be sustained by a normal majority on the vote Monday. Conservative papers today urge the premier to hold on to the office at any cost, while the liberal papers are shrieking at him to get out.

It is reported in lobby circles about the house of commons that at a meeting of the cabinet, held this afternoon Balfour had decided to resign, but there is no confirmation.

**END OF CHICAGO STRIKE**

**Strikers Broke Ranks in Wild Confusion For Work**

During Period 21 Lives Were Lost, Five Hundred Injured, and Cost \$15,000,000 in Money  
 (Scripps News Service.)  
 Chicago, July 21.—Following the calling off of the teamsters' strike to day the strikers broke ranks in a wild stampede for work. In most cases the condition imposed by employers was the hiding of the union button. Of 5000 men who quit probably not more than 1500 will be taken back within the next few days. The strike cost 21 lives, \$15,000,000 in money, and 500 were injured in the rioting.

**CARLTON'S MISTRESS ARRESTED**

She Attempted Suicide by Jumping From Fourth Story Window of Police Office

 New York, July 21.—After having been cross examined by Inspector Cross, Eleanor Van Dwyer, Frederick E. Carlton's mistress, attempted suicide today by trying to jump from the window in the inspector's office at police headquarters in Brooklyn, but was prevented by Cross. The woman was arrested at the instance of Anthony Comstock, charged with violating a section of the penal code forbidding the exposure or sale of certain photographs. The authorities believe the woman can tell facts of sensational interest concerning the man suspected of poisoning his wives. Carlton was arraigned today at the Brooklyn courthouse, charged with larceny.

**COTTAGE GROVE WATER SHORT**

Cottage Grove, July 20.—The water supply is getting quite low and the city council has not yet found a suitable place to build a reservoir. It is thought the matter will be adjusted in a short time, when the contract will be let for ditch digging and building the tank, which is to be a large one. People are not allowed to irrigate as much as they would like to, as the supply must be kept large enough to be used in case of fire.

**HUNDRED EXCURSIONISTS COMING**

Delegates to Christian Convention at San Francisco Will Stop Three Hours in Eugene  
 A special excursion of 100 people from Des Moines, Iowa, enroute home from the International Christian Missionary Convention of the Christian church at San Francisco, will stop at Eugene on August 17-24, will stop at Eugene on August 25 for three hours. The excursionists will visit the Divinity School, University of Oregon and the churches of the city. They will arrive at 6 a. m. and leave at 9.  
 The excursion leaves Des Moines on August 9, coming to the coast via the southern route, stopping at points of interest in Denver, Utah, and Southern California. On the way home Shasta Springs, Eugene, Portland and the Sound cities will be the principal places visited.
