NO SUNDAY BOOZE AT NEWPORT

Corvallis, Or., July 20.—Prosecuting Attorney Brown's announcement that Newport will be closed from next Sunday is causing consternation at that summer resort, as everything has been run there wide-open seven days a week for years. Last Sunday, for the first time in the history of Toledo, Sunday booze was tabooed, and the saloons were closed tightly all day. The Lincoln county grand jury, which has just completed its labors, sprung a sensation by bringing in a true bill against the saloon keepers of Toledo for keeping open on Sunday. Each was fined \$25 and costs, and was warned that a second violation of the law would result in the forfeiture of his license.

Note and Comment

Let it be reported that a couple of men have hung a jury, how soon is inquiry made as to their antecedents, associates and liability of being improperly influenced. O. H. Mook, of Douglas County, and G. O. Walker, of Walker Station, this county, are under the limelight through being the dissenting jurymen in the Williamson-Gesner-Biggs land fraud case at Portland. However innocent, a man stands under suspicion, especially so when prominent reputations or large financial interests are involved. In this case, though, such a disagreement is almost a certain precursor of conviction at the next trial.

A special judge should have been closed with the Williamson jury so as to instruct them every three minutes if necessary. A juror should listen attentively to the evidence and judge's charge, and not require over a dozen instructions.

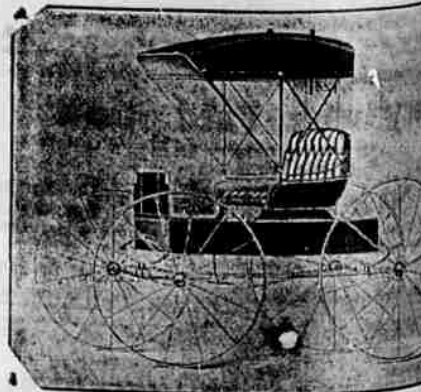
